LOCAL BRIEFS.

A feature of the entertainment to be given the Mining Congress at El Paso will be a rock drilling contest.

Heavy consignments are being received daily of structural iron and steel for the great smelter at Garfield from the Minneapolis Steel and Bridge company.

The last heard from Postmaster Thomas and P. H. Lamm was that they were bathing in the lakes of Killarney, Ireland, and attending the Donnybrook fair.

The completion of the Market street track is delayed on account of the non-arrival of the turnout connections for the main track. The work must be left unfinished until these arrive.

Linemen are readjusting the trolley wires on east side of the street to the new supporting wires connected with the steel standards at the curb, so that the old posts will shortly be removed.

The management of one local coal firm states that his company is 1,200 cars behind its orders, and this last month did less than 25 per cent of its usual business, all on account of the shortage in cars.

Walter D. Dove of Vernal has filed application, with the state engineer, for three sec. ft. of water from the Green river in Uintah county, to irrigate 240 acres. The diverting canal is 18,480 feet long.

Cashier David Evans, of the international revenue office, and his wife were made happy Sunday over the arrival at their home of a 9 1/2 pound boy. All concerned are getting along as well as could be expected.

James Campbell, a married man, charged with an offense with Mrs. Mary K. a sister of Mr. Campbell's wife, waited his preliminary hearing before Judge Diehl yesterday afternoon, and was bound over to the district court. His bond was fixed at \$2,000.

The appearance here on Wednesday and Thursday evening in Barratt hall of Mrs. Bertha Kunz Baker is causing a good sized demand for advance seats. Mrs. Baker makes a far better appearance this year under the auspices of the Mutual Improvement bureau.

Gov. Cutler has received word from Manager Clawson at Portland that the first car load of Utah exhibits had been shipped. The shipment includes the concentrating mill and all of the University of Utah exhibits and is billed to the University which gets the concentrating mill.

George A. Snow and William Darst have filed with City Recorder Critchlow their acceptance of the franchise granted them by the city council on Sept. 7 to maintain and operate a trolley system in this city. The ordinance will be published at once and then become effective.

The young Japanese named W. S. Yamamoto was arraigned yesterday on the charge of assault with a deadly weapon with intent to kill. He is the Japanese who used a knife on Edward Brown in the Japanese restaurant last August. He was given until Wednesday to plead.

Special Agent H. E. Parkhurst of the Palestine Insurance company which carried most of the insurance on the burned coal properties at Stansbury, is at the scene of the disaster, to adjust the losses as far as his company is concerned. Mr. Parkhurst was formerly an insurance official of this city.

The Grocers & Butchers' association will be addressed tonight by Dr. T. D. Beatty, who will discuss the subject, "Pure Food." The meeting will be held in the third floor of the Jennings block, 11 west First south street, commencing at 8:15. All butchers and grocers, whether members of the association or not, are cordially invited.

Prof. F. A. Metcalf begins this evening a series of lectures on Shakespeare, in the City hall, under the auspices of the Unity club. He will read the dagger scene from "Macbeth," the closet and grave digger's scenes from "Hamlet," the trial scene from "The Merchant of Venice" and a selection from "Othello." Miss Emma Erickson and C. A. Barrett will assist.

Otto Bersback, a well known traveling man, resident in this city, is dead at the residence of S. S. Pond, 573 State street, from erysipelas, after only a week's illness, at the age of 41. The remains will be shipped to Burlington, Ia., for interment. Mr. Bersback's only relative in this city is Mrs. Samuel C. Porter. His sister, Mrs. Ashley McDonald of Chicago, is here to accompany her brother's remains back east. The deceased was a native of Chicago.

At last night's meeting of the Men's club of the First Congregational church, the debate ended in a victory for the side declaring in favor of the United States government building the Panama canal. One of the points brought out by the affirmative was that with the building of the canal, freight could be brought from New York to Salt Lake via San Diego for \$5.00 per ton.

CALLED SUDDLY.

Albert R. Day, University Student, a Victim of Appendicitis.

Albert R. Day, a student at the University of Utah, died at the Groves L. D. S. hospital at 6:10 Monday morning of appendicitis. The young man was apparently in good health until 8 o'clock Sunday morning when he was taken suddenly ill and on the advice of Dr. Keith, who was called in, was removed to the hospital in the afternoon. At 8 o'clock Sunday night he was operated on by Drs. Allen and Keith for appendicitis, and appeared to be doing well until 5 o'clock, when he took a turn for the worse and passed away at 8:10.

Mr. Day was 25 years of age and a very ambitious young man, doing everything possible to advance himself educationally. He was formerly a student of the Y. U. at Provo and was principal of the Kanab public schools for two years. He was married a year ago to Miss Bessie Woolley, daughter of President E. D. Woolley of Kanab. He had a host of friends who will be shocked to hear of his demise.

The remains will be taken to Fillmore, former home of the deceased, for interment, the funeral taking place there on Thursday.
