The experiments were ordered by the minister of Marine to find out precisely the resistance of the armored redoubts of the Italia and Lepanto, clad with Schneider steel or compound (Sheffield) plates, and above all to ascertain the effective power of the new Armstrong 43 Inch breech-load-ing gun with forged and tempered steel projectiles. For this purpose there had ocen erected three targets represent-ing the redoubt of the Italia. The plates were placed against a backing of teak wood 520 millimeters thick.
