THURSDAY, October 14, 1875. Three Months of Freedom.

T. J. London, one of the American jubilee singers now in England, writes to the Pittsburg Gazette as follows:

I have never known practically the meaning of the word freedom in its highest sense but three months in my life, and though it is with shame for my own boasted land of freedom it is yet it is true that three months have been spent in Great Britain.

And I now affirm that no black man, born and raised in the United States of America, can realize what it is to be absolutely free. And I further assert that no black man in America can realize what he suffers, and what a depressing and humiliating influence his manhood and higher nature is under, until he is able to rise above and breathe an atmosphere unobscured by the deadly and polluting poison of American prejudice.

How different was their treatment here! For three weeks they sang in one of Mr. Moody's meetings. A hall had been built for him in the east of London, with seatings for 400. The hall consisted of about one hundred persons. Seats were assigned to us in front and next to the stand.
