No Man's Land—Emperor William's

Washington, July 19.—Acting Sec-

retary Thompson to-day received re-

ports of the special examiners ap-

pointed to examine the books and ac-

counts of the discharging officers of the

second auditor's and sixth auditor's

Lightning's Work.

WHEELING, W. Va., July 19.—The

excessive heat culminated last night in

a terrific storm. The rain and wind

were heavy, demolishing shade trees

and fences and for an hour there was

not a second's intermission between

the flashes of lightning. Grafton
