

Congressional Appropriations for Utah.

Extract from "An Act making Appropriations for the Legislative, Executive, and Judicial Expenses of the Government for the year ending June thirtieth, eighteen hundred and seventy-six, and for Other Purposes."

For salaries of governor, chief justice and two associate judges, and secretary, fifteen thousand dollars.

For legislative expenses, namely, for compensation and mileage of members of the legislative assembly, officers, clerks, and others, twenty-three thousand four hundred dollars; and this appropriation may be used, under the direction of the Department of Justice, to defray the judicial expenses of the supreme and district courts of said Territory; and the amount so used shall be reimbursed to said appropriation out of the treasury of said Territory; and, until said reimbursement shall be fully made, no member or officer of said legislative assembly shall be entitled to any compensation or allowance out of any money of the United States; for rent of secretary's office, six hundred dollars; storage and care of Government property, three hundred dollars; fuel, two hundred dollars; stationery, lights, and incidental expenses, five hundred dollars; in all, twenty-five thousand dollars.

For contingent expenses of the Territory, to be expended by the Governor, \$1,000.

LYFORD STILL LYING AROUND.

IS HE ON ANOTHER BEGGING EXPEDITION?

NEW YORK, March 14.—At the Central Methodist Episcopal Church, on Seventh avenue, today, Rev. O. P. Lyford, pastor of the Methodist Church in Provo, Utah, delivered a very eloquent and interesting sermon, being a description and exposition of Mormonism and its doctrines. He eulogized the country of Utah, stating that it was one of the most interesting portions of this country, with its rich and fertile valleys and delightful scenery and climate. The people of Utah, however, were the most oppressed and degraded in the world. He characterized Brigham Young as the greatest despot and monster living. The spirit of Mormonism is in intense hostility to all human government or law. He claimed that Brigham Young possesses more power than the Pope, because the latter governs by legislation, while Brigham controls the territorial legislature, holds a hundred thousand people in the worst bondage, and holds the lowest vices as the first principles of religion. He gave a description of the spy system adopted in every village in the Territory, by which all private family matters were reported by spies to Brigham. In this way Brigham controlled elections. He also gave a vivid picture of the horrible condition of society in consequence of the practice of polygamy. It is a general thing, said the speaker, to see a Mormon with a family of five or six wives and twenty or more children living in a hut containing only two or three rooms. Under such circumstances, the children of such parents could not possibly grow up with the slightest sense of morality. He related numerous instances and descriptions of the condition of the Mormon Church, and in conclusion said the founders of the Methodist Church at Provo had resolved to remain in that God-forsaken Territory, notwithstanding the opposition of the Mormons, and to solve the Mormon problem by establishing Christian schools and churches and disseminating Christian literature, for where these influences exist Mormonism must perish.—*S. F. Chronicle.*

Invention for Walking on the Water.

An invention for walking on the water has been invented by W. J. Allen, of Put-in-Bay Island, which, for oddity, practicability, etc., caps the climax of all water crafts ever yet invented and possesses merit in principles never before adopted. It combines five distinct principles: First—As a water shoe for sports-

men to wear on their feet in swails, marshes and open water, in pursuit of game, fish, etc.; each shoe being air and water tight, having a buoyancy of from one hundred and sixty to two hundred and eighty pounds, and only weighing from fourteen and one-half to twenty-nine pounds, which is not lifted, but slid with ease and rapidity through swamps and water.

Second—By coupling two shoes together, from four to seven feet apart, they form a safe, staunch and beautiful sail boat, they being finely modeled for speed.

Third—When propelled by paddle-wheel, as exhibited, the operator rides forward, instead of backward.

Fourth—By adjusting the third shoe (or boat), each playing loose on an axle and being side by side, and from five to eight feet apart, having another attached from five to ten feet in front, in line between the two hind boats, acting upon swivel hinges and used as a rudder, which is guided by the feet, having a paddle wheel between the two hind shoes, from four to six feet in diameter, propelled by the hands.

Fifth—By attaching steel runners, or skates, to the keels, they form a complete ice boat, that can navigate any condition of ice or water with great speed and safety.

The inventor proposes to race the fleetest crafts now on water, even first-class steamers, and beat their time with one man power. Their exceeding strength, lightness, buoyancy, safety and speed is a marvel beyond description. These wonderful shoes will be on exhibition in this city in a short time, when the public will have an opportunity to witness the novel performance and examine the operations of an invention which, if as represented by the inventor, renders possible a feat that hasn't been accomplished since the days of the Apostles Peter.—*Sandusky Register.*

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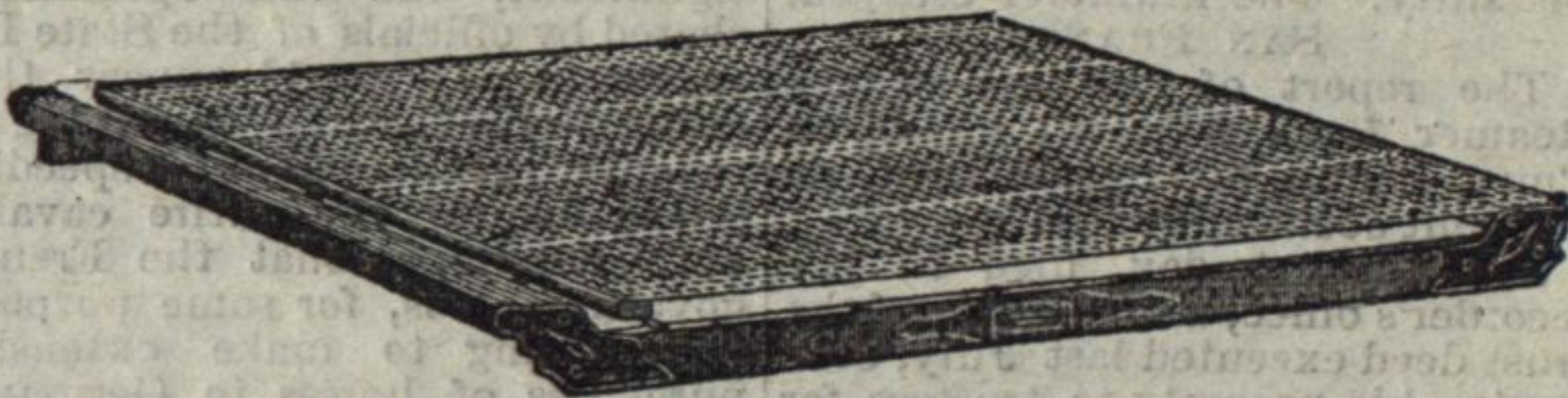
