CHICAGO, Oct. 2.—The *Morning News* says the rough draft of an address advising the farmers of the country, to hold their own for higher prices has been made, and it is expected will appear in full in the next issue of the *Farmer's Times*.

It advises the sale only of so much of the crop as is actually needed for home consumption until the foreign demand puts the prices up, then sell only so much as is necessary to supply that demand, and again look up the price until they get up again.

News from Alaska.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 2.—The steamer cutter "Albatross" arrived from Alaska today, bringing dispatches from the gold and silver fields. Dr. Jackson, government geologist, and the steamer cutter, which has been two years in upper Alaska surveying the United States boundary line. Dr. Jackson reports the government schools had a prosperous year. The introduction of the Siberian reindeer into Alaska promises to be successful. All the British war vessels have left Alaska and the United States. "The Bear" will remain until December. A large number of sealers were "warmed" during the season.

Mr. McGrath, of the boundary commission, reported all was accomplished that was expected. The camp of the McGrath party, which was established August 15, 1890, was found Camp (Alaska). It was in the Yukon river, about 100 miles from the mouth and exactly on the Alaska boundary. The exploring expedition made their headquarters until June 22 last. McGrath says the territory north of the camp is an absolutely impenetrable wilderness. During the winter of 1890 provisions ran very low at the camp, the supply steamer having been wrecked.

McGrath pays a high tribute to McCarthy and French, two of his men who went that winter 600 miles down the Yukon to discover the boundary. McCarthy started to return. The cold was intense. They turned their way along the river, the journey taking seventy days, and finally reached camp with provisions. They had to cut off their feet in the last days, drawing the sledges and suffering great privation.

News Will Not Return.

CHICAGO, Oct. 2.—Commissioner of Penitentiaries Baum arrived in the city late tonight. In an interview with a reporter he said it was not true, as reported, that he tendered his resignation to the President at Washington's conference. He said, however, as he did not wish to embarrass the administration and if his conduct of the penitentiary business had not been satisfactory, or if the President evinced the vague charges against his department, he (Baum) was willing his management should cease. The President notified him cordially that the conduct of the office under his administration had been entirely satisfactory and the subject of a change was not further discussed. Furthermore, Secretary Noble has repeatedly assured the commissioner of his entire confidence.

Martin Gould of Lincoln, Neb., committed suicide under peculiar circumstances. He was a confidant for the confederate prize at Culver University, but only got second place. After the announcement of prize he went out and shot himself. He was in love with a Lincoln young lady who promised to marry him provided he was the first prize at the contest. Otherwise she would have nothing to do with him. He did not win, therefore he killed himself.

French Canadians, who have over the border into New England usually Anglize their names in the course of a generation or so. Dubouche, Wood, Des Broussard and Lavigne became Rivers, etc. Unusually curious French anglicizations result from the practice. Not long ago a French Canadian named Noel Bonaparte took his naturalization papers at Christchurch, New Zealand.
