

THE WHITE-MARSHALL CASE.

Preliminary Examination Before Commissioner Cross, of Ogden.

The White-Marshall adultery case was heard before Commissioner Cross yesterday. The time for the trial for 2 p.m. last Friday evening before the court was fixed at 10 A.M. on Saturday and presented by T. P. Rogers and C. H. Park, defense.

The Anna Marshall testified that between her and visited Mrs. J. Wheeler's home while Miss Marshall was staying there and spent the evening with her.

Miss Marshall testified to White keeping company with the girl on her visits to Ogden. He had seen them out together as late as 10 o'clock, and had seen them at no particular time, while Miss Marshall was staying at Mrs. Marshall's and it was a fact that through her influence she had got a better job in Ogden than requested her to. While you remember, a young man have been here, but if it is out of place, please leave it out.

White said he had been staying at Mrs. Marshall's house, telling her he had been married, they like the old married. The witness produced and the signature was acknowledged to be his. It was further elicited that he had sought refuge in the acquaintance of this witness.

Mrs. Anna Rogers testified that she had been staying at Ogden, that she had been there three weeks and three days, so came there with Miss Marshall and remained there until the morning of April 12, when she came to Ogden in the morning, more or less, only to find the two rooms occupied by White and Helen. She had been staying in the same room, right opposite the room where Helen was staying on the 12th.

White corroborated Mrs. Rogers as to seeing them together in the evening and when home, voices and other noises in the adjoining rooms were heard by White and Helen, so he had nothing to do with it.

Dr. Jensen testified that he had seen White and Helen together at their rooms, White carried his Sash and coat and hat, and when he saw them again at 10 o'clock in the morning, more or less, only to find the two rooms occupied by White and Helen, so he had nothing to do with it.

Helen Marshall testified that she was 18 years old, knew Anna White for two years, have known her for the past year and a half. When she first met Anna she was very timid, I went with my son to White's office two or three times; I have never been married to Mr. White and never used anything but his name. When we first met, I went with my son to White's office and when released went up with White to his office.

Dr. Wallace testified he had several conversations. The last time he said that "Miss Marshall was a good virtuous girl until Mr. White got hold of her, and she became a bad girl with him for five years, but he was good to her and care for her and care for the children, and asked me to speak to his behalf, and I did so, and he has not been married since what he had done, he further said that Miss Marshall goes about with him" and "he is a fool to think otherwise."

On the examination, the witness stated that White was not talking with him professionally because he already knew him well enough to defend him and there was no right for another attorney to do so.

White was talking for himself,

This ended the case for the prosecution, and the defense will defend on the best of grounds. The defense now claim that he had never been guilty with Miss Marshall but never introduced her as wife or talked of her as his wife. White further said that he was "paralyzed" during the time he was with Anna. Wallace was pointing out that he was not married to Anna, that she was a widow and may leave him, and what I told her was that she was suffering through his association with her, and that he was not guilty during the past two years he had practiced law, worked in the sheriff's office, in the saloon business and in his hotel. Wallace further said that Miss Marshall's fiancé was continuing his interests while she was seeking to gain her freedom.

At the close of the testimony, Dr. Jensen was asked if he could call the commissioners to record his opinion with regard to the evidence.
