WEBER COUNTY AFFAIRS.

City Council Grants Franchise to Utah Independent Telephone Company.

Addition to County Infirmary Proposed - Norris Held for Assault-Ballantyne Recital a Success.

At the board of county commissioner's meeting held May 18, 1903, in commissioner Stanford's report in relation to the infirmery and the occupants and needs at the present time he stated :

"Gentlemen-Over one year ago 1 called the board's attention to the need of building an addition to the infirmary, as there was not room to meet any demand for the admission of more inmates, but in view of our having to build at that time, two new bridges in the county, which was afterwards done, the one at Plain City and the other at the entrance to Ogden canyon, the matthe entrance to Ogden canyon, the mat-ter for the want of funds to meet ex-penditures was laid over. It is now a necessity; we must enlarge this build-ing. For the past six weeks we have been paying for the support of indigent sick at the hospital and iodginghouses double the amount it would cost to keep them at the informary were these score them at the infirmary, were there room to receive them. We have in each room, as the present building is arranged, from two to three occupants. We have other charges on the county who should be placed in the infirmary.

be placed in the infirmary. The present building, erected about 15 years ago, cost about \$11,800. There is as much need now of an addition as there was in that day to build and pro-vide a home for the poor. Under the new county government bill there will be preater demand upon the board to make provision for the destitute and homeless poor, especially of the tran-tion class than in the past. I hold it sient class, than in the past. I hold it is a special feature of the duties of the board that ample provision be made for the invalid and aged poor of the county. I regard this duty to be paramount to the providing good roads, bridges, sprinkling, etc., etc. It appeals to our umanity, our charity and benevolence. therefore ask, as commissioner of poor be allowed to engage an architect to furnish a plan for an annex to the county infirmary at a cost not to exceed \$5,000, the same plan to be submitted for the approval of the board at our next meeting, and, if accepted, plans and specifications in detail to follow." Dr. Forbes stated that the condition

described in the report of Commissioner on Poor, Mr. Standish, was entirely true and that there were several cases that should have been sent there had not the building been already overcrowded, but such persons were kept at a greater cost to the county.

Attorney Hulaniski represented that under the present county bill there who be patients more than ever before who will need attention and care at such willing, and in view of our county's Charles E. 


