Lyte Gregory Murdered in Cold Blood in the Streets of Denver.

PERPETRATORS ARE UNKNOWN.

He Was Accused of Having Been One Of the Men Who Assaulted Committeeman Wardjon.

Denver, May 15,-Lyte Gregory, an ex-policeman, was assassinated at an early hour this morning as he was returning home from a social visit with friends. His body was riddled with builet and he died in his tracks. It is believed that the assassin used a repeating rifle, and his aim was true, for in all ten bullets penetrated the murdered man's body. Although bloodhounds were given the trail shortly after the murder occurred, no positive trace of the assassin has been

The murder occurred on West Third The murder occurred on West Third avenue, near South Water street, a section of the city inhabited by the working class. Gregory was alone and unarmed. Mrs. John Coombs, a neigh-boring woman, who heard the shots, also heard the cry. "You murdering blackguard!" and thought the voice was that of her husband, whose return home she was awaiting. Combs was was that of her husband, whose return home she was awaiting. Combs was later found at a bowling alley and placed under arrest. It is said that Combs had been at the alley all even-ing and no evidence of guilt has yet been traced to him. He is being held, however, the same set of the same set of the set of however.

Gregory, recently had served the Gregory, recently had served the Reno detective agency and was one of the men accused by William Ward-jon, the national committeeman of the United Mine Workers of America, with assaulting him on a Rio Grande Train near Salida, Colo. recently. Wardjon was badly beaten up and claimed that four of the Bean agency men were his four of the Reno agency men were hu assailants. Gregory had only just re-turned to the city, having been absent several weeks. Letters found on his person indicate that he was aware of Wardjon's accusation.

Wardjon's accusation. The police now believe that two men participated in the shooting of Greg-ory. It develops that only four shots were fired, but the riddled condition of Gregory's body leads to the conviction that a shotgun loaded with heavy shot was used. It is also evident that a re-valvee hullet neartrated the brain and volver bullet penetrated the brain and was the immediate cause of death. De-tectives working on the case have unearthed the fact that two strangers haunted the vicinity of the shooting all evening, one of whom carried what ap-parently was a gun or rifle. It has also been learned that a stranger enalso been learned that a stranger en-tered the saloon in which Gregory was engaged at cards during the evening and scanned the interior as if search-ing for someone.
