# **KWANG AGREES** TO TEN DEMANDS

An Indemnity of Seven Hundred Million Taels.

### TO BE PAID IN SIXTY YEARS

### A Monument to the Memory of Baron von Ketteler-Punishment of Boxer Leaders.

Tien Tsin, Dec. 14 .- According to credible Chinese sources of information, Emperor Kwang Su will agree to the following ten demands of the powers:

First-Indemnity to the amount of 700,000,000 taels, payable with sixty years and guaranteed by the Li Kin. Second-The erection in Pekin of a suitable monument to the memory of

Baron von Ketteler. Third-An imperial prince, a near relative to the emperor, to go to Berlin to apologize and express regret for the murder

Fourth-Foreign troops to hold the lines of communication between Taku and Pekin

Fifth-Punishment of the Boxer offi-Sixth-Candidates from districts

where anti-foreign outrages have been perpetrated not to be allowed to compete in the Chinese examination in Pe-

kin for five years. Seventh-Abolition of the tsung-ll-

Eighth-Foreign envoys to have access to the emperor at all times. Ninth-Importation of arms and am-

munition into the province of Chili to be abolished.

Tenth-The land and sea forts be-tween Shan Hai Kwan, Taku and Pekin to be destroyed. LI HUNG HAS AMPLE AUTHORITY.

Pekin, Dec. 13 .- Li Hung Chang and Prince Ching have sent an official notification to the ministers that they have received the promised documents authorizing them to act in behalf of China in the peace negotiations and announcing that they are ready to proceed as soon as the ministers desire.

### MUST PAY THE DUTY.

French Want Tariff on American Furniture at Exposition.

New York, Dec. 15 .- A disputch to the Journal and Advertiser from Paria says:

The French customs authorities have served notice upon Mr. Woodward, as sistant United States exhibition commissioner, that they will not permi-him to leave France until he has paid duty on a magnificent set of furnitur which was moved from the Unite States pavillon to his private apartments.

As government property no duty wa charged when it was brought to Paris but as Mr. Woodward took the furni ture for its private use, it is liable t customs. The secretary of the treasur in Washington has notified Mr. Wood ward that his salary is withheld unt the furniture is restored. It is wort \$3,000. Woodward says he is acting et tirely within his rights in taking the

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#### Arrested for Election Fraud.

New York, Dec. 15,-Alexander S. Williams, a nephew of Former Inspec-tor Alexander S. Williams, of Manhattan, has been arrested on a warrant issued from the district attorney's of fice in Queen's county. ### Funds for Brown University.

Providence, R. I., Dec. 15 .- At a meeting of the executive committee of the Brown university, President Fauncere reported that good progress was being made in securing a second million dollars for the university endowment Several handsome subscriptions fund. have been received, including one of \$10,000 and another of \$25,000. The second million will not probably be cash entirely as the university needs books. apparatus, etc. It is expected the sec-ond million will be raised before commencement day.

#### Sale of Seal Skins.

Victoria, B. C., Dec. 15 .- Advices have been received of the sales of the seal skins held at the Hudson Bay & son company's London office. 35,000 skins were sold. The Lampson prices averaged 63 shillings six pence for British Columbia skins and 70 shillings six pence for Behring Sea skins at Lampson's and 60 shillings six pence, respectively at the Hudson Bay Co.

### Cannot Trust State Courts.

New York, Dec. 15 .- Application on behalf of seven stockholders of the Anglo- American Savings & Loan association, has been made to Judge La-combe in the United States circuit court for the appointment of a receiver. The argument of the attorney was based chiefly on the question of juris-diction. He said that the United States court should take charge of the case "We cannot trust the State courts," said the attorney, "nor the attorney general. The State superintendent of banking has allowed these people to file reports which covered up transac-tions in real estate out of which they

must have made a great deal of The attorney for certain other stockholders argued that the matter was without the jurisdiction of the United States courts. He called the attention of the court to the fact that Justice Maddox had appointed two directors for the property in this State. This seemed to be news to Judge LaCombe and he remarked that he had not known that the State courts had taken any action in the matter. He took the papers and reserved his decision.
