

HOW THE VICTORY "TOOK" IN UTAH.

That Portion that Resides in Salt Lake Made the "Welkin Ring."

NOISES MANY AND TERRIFIC.

Republicans Had It Their Own Way And Made the Most of the Occasion—How They Celebrated.

There was a mighty throng and a mighty horn aggregation on Main street last night, that "made the welkin ring" to a deafening degree. Some enterprising spirits gathered up about 100 empty kerosene cans to which they attached strings, and then distributed the outfit to a lively bunch of wild and hilarious youth. The latter dragged the cans up and down the thoroughfare at a rattling gait, and the din was accentuated by yet other gilded and patriotic youth chasing the fleeing moments over the street with long strips of metal roofing. There were innumerable horns jammed into innumerable mouths, and innumerable congregations of noises most unusual made the atmosphere for many a weary hour. Women and girls divided the din with the blaring horns. There were parties of firecrackers exploded through the main thoroughfares but young men with horses had sense enough for the most part to keep their animals at home, and there were in consequence no runaways to chronicle. There were carefully watched to avoid the property on fire. Cow bells were considerably in evidence, and there was intermittent and not over hearty cheering. There was an immense crowd in front of the Herald office, and a fair sized crowd in front of the Tribune office, eagerly watching the stereopticon announcements—such as they were. But these were not very satisfactory, as they were few and far between, and alleged funny pictures were worked off on the crowds which waited patiently during the long drawn out function.

When the crowds got tired, they varied the tedious program with copious clouds of paper confetti which gave the street the appearance of an incipient snowstorm. Long before midnight the outward bound cars resembled a parade, as they were packed with citizens returning home, satisfied with the knowledge that the Republican ticket had swept the nation from Maine to California and that the country "was safe." SPERRY'S HOLDUPS ARE BAD CITIZENS.

Chief Lynch Discovers Proof That They Are Highway-men.

THEY ROBBED A MAN IN OGDEN

Crime Was Committed a Week Ago And They Came Here and Pawned a Watch.

Fred Morris and John Harper, the two holdups who were so cleverly captured by Officer Sperry on Saturday night last are likely to go to the state prison for a term of years for highway robbery. Chief of Police Lynch was in Ogden yesterday, and secured convincing evidence that the men are the ones who hid up a switchman in the employ of the Southern Pacific company. The holdup occurred a week ago last night, and the thugs secured from the man 60 cents and a fine 17 jeweled watch which they pawned in Salt Lake upon their arrival here. Harper had the pawn ticket on him and the watch has been recovered and identified. The men will probably be taken to Ogden to answer to the charge of highway robbery.

An answer is still forthcoming from the chairman of the alleged "Anti-C" party committee, as to how he knew of the arrival of the prospective arrival of the precious pair in Salt Lake just before election. Morris received a letter from the chairman. It was addressed to 15 Commercial street. Judge Dehl gave them 10 days each, and they were unable to follow the instructions given in the letter to Morris, and they did not vote.
