

## MARTIN FAILED TO BE PRESENT

Alderman Who Gave Sign of Becoming a Reformer Turns Up Missing.

### COMMITTEE GETS RESOLUTION

Race Track Gambling Matter Not Allowed to Go by the Board Despite Fact of His Absence.

Councilman Louis D. Martin, who failed last week as a moralist, reformer and philanthropist, much to the surprise of the other members of the council, did not "show up" last night at the meeting of the city council to present his resolution to instruct the chief of police to close up the horse races and betting ring which is being demanded by the business men and the citizens in general. It was rumored that Martin had made a winning during the week, and last night felt it his duty to attend the opening performance of "Three Weeks" at the Colonial. Councilman Black said that Martin had telephoned the council and would be at council meeting on account of a pressing engagement. In view of this Black said that the matter ought to be laid over a week. Councilman Fernstrom objected, saying that he had heard that somebody had made a winning this week, and he demanded an investigation. He asked that the matter go to the municipal laws committee to be investigated. This was carried by the council. Martin's reconsideration of the liquor license granted to Heath Bros. was called. On account of his absence, the motion was made by Councilman Reed and was defeated, and the license granted. Councilman Black presented a resolution asking the members of the council to support the capital building election today, and use their influence to get the citizens out to the polls. It was carried unanimously.

Sharp to protect the property of the Minneapolis Steel & Machinery company at the Commercial club building where the structural iron workers have gone on strike. ## THE ROUND OF THE THEATERS

GRAND—Democritus the Abderite could not have laughed so heartily as he did when he saw "The Blue Mouse" at the Grand last night. Being a Clyde Pith comedy presented by the Shuberts it was expected to be above the ordinary and not sensational, trite or dull. Such witless, weak comedy of situation, such seemingly trite and old-fashioned farce, and all hopes were full. But even drollest Heracitus can be favored with too much of the rollicking philosophy of the Abderite, and so at the middle of the second act many were surfeited with merriment.

The first act is filled with spontaneity and humor; but in the other two are overdrawn situations, and strained perplexity to such an extent that laughter becomes expressionless—a drug.

The story, a trifle racy, is based on the tangled web people weave when they mistake identities. Augustus Rollett, in a bid to win a railroad promotion introduces the stranger, the president, the "Blue Mouse" a pretty danseuse as his wife who cajoles and flirts with Lewellyn until he willingly grants her request to make her "husband" Superintendent. Mrs. Lewellyn suspects the real Mrs. Rollett, and so husband and wives are all confused.

As the "Blue Mouse" Elsa Ryan was charming, her thin little laugh and limber mannerisms of the amorous woman, regaling the mind with the keenest interest and enjoyment of the sharpest equal honor with Miss Ryan was Linda Palmer as Mrs. Lewellyn. In fact the memory of her impersonation lingers as quite the strangest of the whole play. In make-up, gesture, and voice she was a perfect specimen of the jealous old wife, and, joyful, band, it was the same—every movement a roar.

Just as good as Miss Ryan or Miss Palmer was Wilton Taylor as Lewellyn, the railroad president. Physically he is admirably fitted and histrionically he is good. It is little surprise that Messrs. Shuberts have decided to "star" him next year.

As Augustus Rollett, Geoffrey C. Stein was at times excellent; and so was Caroline Pearce as Mrs. Rollett. All in all, if you want to take a nepenthe and sit within the diverting influence of Euphrosyne for two jolly hours, see "The Blue Mouse."

## GARBAGE MATTER DUE FOR AIRING

Health Commissioner Starts Something When Asking For More Help.

### MEAT ORDINANCE PASSED.

Effective August 1, When Inspectors Will be Named—Market Under Consideration.

An investigation into the garbage department of the city board of health stirred up a bad odor last night at a meeting of the city council. It came up when Dr. M. R. Stewart sent a communication to the council asking for two extra wagons. Councilmen Fernstrom and Hall declared that the system was wrong and after some discussion the entire matter to the sanitary committee with instructions to install better service if possible.

The public health department's routes every day, but it is charged that the men gather up the heavy garbage and leave the light rubbish in the streets to blow back in the yards again. The garbage men are paid by the pound and they have found that they can not make quite so much money by hauling away all the garbage.

For the last three weeks complaints have been coming in so fast to the health department about garbage being left in the streets that it has taken two men to answer the telephones. Dr. Stewart believed that there was not enough teams to haul it away so he asked for two additional teams.

When his communication was read, Councilman Fernstrom said that there were plenty of teams if the men would do their work. "The system is wrong," he said, "that is what's the matter with the garbage department. If the city would pay the teamsters by the hour or the day the garbage would be hauled without any trouble. As it is now the haulers take the heavy garbage and leave the rubbish and papers and stuff to blow about the streets, over the lawns and back in the lots again. I am in favor of giving the department two additional wagons until the matter can be straightened out."

### ALWAYS WANTING MORE.

Councilman Hall took occasion to criticize the health department not only the garbage department, but also in the manner in which contagious diseases are handled. He declared that the department was always asking for help or an increase in money for some of the employees and that the work was no more efficient than before.

The meat ordinance was passed last night and will go into effect on Aug. 1. The appointment of an inspector will not be made until the day the ordinance goes into effect. His salary is fixed at \$1,500 a year and he is required to give a bond of \$5,000 and present a certificate to show that he is a graduate of a veterinary school. His deputies must have the same qualifications and give a bond of \$2,500.

Walter J. Frazier, food and dairy inspector, reported to the council last night that L. J. Bowers who had leas-

ed the Continental Hay market for the purposes of opening a city market for the farmers so that they could sell their produce there, had complied with all the requirements of the health department and asked that he be given a special permit. Councilman Hall spoke on the subject and said that the place for the market was on the north side of Pioneer square. The matter went to the committee on markets to consider the proposition.

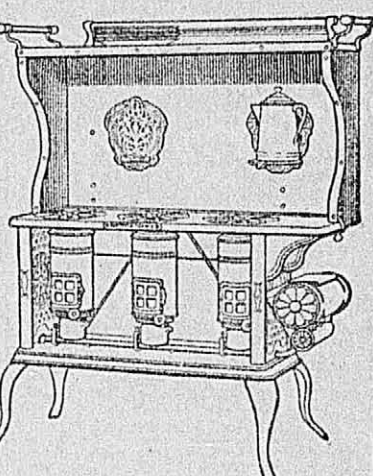
The resignation of A. F. Miller, patrolman, was accepted without any
