Precipitation occurred over portions of Oregon, Utah, Idaho, Colorado, Nebraska, Missouri, North Dakota, South Dakota, Minnesota, Illinois, Texas, Louisiana, and British Columbia. It was raining this morning at Huron, S. D., and Moorhead, Minn. Thunderstorms were reported at North Platte, S. D., Grand Junction, and New Orleans, 1.94 inch; and Galveston, 1.04 inch.

The temperature fell 10 to 12 degrees over Idaho, and rose 12 over portions of Utah, with slight changes in other states.

The coroner's jury decided yesterday afternoon, that the two babies recently found dead in this city, came to their death at the hands of persons unknown to the jury.

IRRIGATING PROJECTS.

Los Angeles Man Says He Understands That Utah's Are All Right.

W. H. Sanders, of Los Angeles, consulting engineer in the government reclamation service, was in town last evening, en route to Montrose, Colo., for consultation with engineers engaged on the Gunnison irrigation project. Mr. Sanders says it is the policy of the government to push all such projects with the greatest dispatch possible. He understands that the Utah projects are in good form and will be carried through without delay. Mr. Sanders called attention to the fact that Utah farmers need to learn the economical use of water, as more is being wasted than actually utilized. Under the new regime farmers will be permitted to take only the water they need, although they might be willing to pay for more. The government will protect them against themselves.
