LIBRARY IN RESIDENCE OF HON. DAVID KEITH.

The above halftone is from a photograph showing a portion of the interior of the Keith residence on east South Temple street—one of the handsomest residences recently erected in Salt Lake. The most beautiful room is the reception hall—a room somewhat octagon shaped, with the various apartments comprising the first floor opening from the handsome rotunda. West of the entrance on the front is the parlor, beautifully finished in hard wood, and opposite on the east is the library—a tempting corner with

its books, lounging chairs, and other handsome and appropriate appointments, a view of which is presented in the above cut. The dining-room is in the northwest, and its furnishings, like those of the rest of the house, are in keeping with the elegance of the frame in which they are set.

The reception hall is beautifully designed. At the north side, facing the entrance is an elaborate mantel, with a mirror reaching to the cornice, and finished with artistic carving.

The walls of the apartment are of East Indian wood, their polished surface reflecting almost as clearly as a mirror. The solid wood cornice is studded with large white electric

globes, circular in shape, and the newel post at the foot of the handsome staircase, which ascends from the hall, is capped with a huge dome-shaped globe. The combined effect—especially when the light-producing a most artistic ornamentation.

Under the staircase is a pretty, crescent-shaped window-seat, and above, at the first landing, a picture-window of stained glass gives the finishing point to this artistic interior. Its ceiling is a dome of stained glass, whose colored light streams through an open shaft formed by circular railings and balustrades which edge the halls on each of the upper floors. From these halls or balconies the rooms open in

much the same order as below, the small one over the lower entrance, which is connected with an Indian coxycorner—Navajo rugs, draperies, Indian heads and bric-a-brac creating a charming picture. Another unique and beautiful apartment is the Japanese room, which is connected with a dream of dainty lacquer work, colored lanterns, screens and every conceivable kind of decorated artwork known to the realms of the Mikado. On this floor is the billiard room, sewing room, and more sleeping apartments—with a staircase leading down on the north to kitchen and pantries on the ground floor.
