Driggs, Fremont Co., Idaho, Jan. 21 .---We are enjoying an unusually fine winter in the Tetons, hardly sufficient snow for sleighing, an ideal winter for stock and range horses. Many of the ranchers are not feeding.

The predictions are freely made, that the coming season will be the greatest in the history of the Teton valley both regarding crops and immigration. The question of water for irrigation purposes which it seems is a most vital one to the farmers of Utah and Idaho, is one easily solved in this valley, for we have enough to put twelve inches on every acre of tillable land. There are creeks running from the mountains the river, from three to five miles apart from one end of the valley to the other, and every one is easily accessible and eight months in the year, this is a most delightful place to reside, the climate is becoming modified as the results of cultivation, so that the other four are no longer a terror to any-

Two-thirds of the land in this valley is owned by Salt Lake and Utah peo-ple. Many improvements have been made in the past five years. Up to that time those who came in were undecided as to the future and prospects, but now there is a network of fencing and many modern dwellings and business houses It has been proven without a doubt that small grain and vegetables can be raised here with success. Timothy is a native of this valley and two or three car loads are hauled out each year. Many are starting their farms with al-

falfa and harvest two crops. Our people seem to be public spirited this winter as there are two Latter-day Saint churches in course of construc-tion as well as three dancing halis, all of which are built of lumber and rustic siding, and will be a credit to our prospering valley. Taking it all in all, this is a good place for home seekers, those in search of good land, water, timber and healthful climate could do no better.
