Rules to be Observed.

Notwithstanding the fact that instructions have been given to the effect that only members of the Church who obtain recommendations will be admitted to the dedication services of the Salt Lake Temple, numerous inquiries are made as to whether small children will be permitted to pass in. The regulations do not allow the admission of children who have not been baptized. Parents and guardians should not attempt to break over this rule, as those who will be in charge of the entrances ought not to be compelled to turn away the little ones as well as those having them in their care.

The times for opening the south and west gates for all sessions exclusive of the first (that of the morning of the 6th) are 8 a.m. and 12:30 p.m.

No person will, under any circumstances, be admitted at the gates later than 8:30 a.m. or 12:30 p.m., respectively. In all probability the gates will be closed before those hours.

The agreed-upon time of the Temple after each service will be by the northwest and northeast doors, respectively, and from the block by the north and east gates.

DIVORCE PROCEEDINGS.

Williams vs. Williams.—The third hearing comes to an end.

In the Third District court last evening was tried the divorce suit brought by Martha Williams against her husband, John C. Eight years ago the parties intermarried in this city, and plaintiff alleges that her husband committed adultery with one Enoch O. Tapp in Salt Lake in April, 1882, and at various times thereafter. It may be remembered that Williams was arrested upon the same charges as are made in the complaint about a year ago. At that time he had simply left his wife temporarily and was living with Tapp at the Wardington. He was tried in Commissioner Neumont's court and held to the grand jury, but released on bail and was subsequently tried again by that body. His hearing was called in the Third District court on February 22nd of the present year and being absent his bond was declared forfeited.

Yesterday afternoon the case of Attorney F. E. Barker vs. Eliza J. and Samuel H. Smith came before Commissioner Greenman for hearing. The parties were unable to agree, so it was adjourned to be set for argument, provided Mrs. Smith in securing a divorce from her husband before Judge Anderson, referee. She obtained the decree, but Judge Zane never passed on the matter, and in the meantime the couple lived together and made up. The Commissioner found in favor of the defendants.

Atorney W. E. Talbot, as referee, has dismissed his task in the hearing of the Charlotte E. Thurgood vs. George Thurgood suit. It has been settled and dismissed.

THE MATHEMATICAL SOCIETY.
