

UTAH BREEDERS' ASSOCIATION

Organized in the Federal Court Room Last Night.

A meeting was held in the Federal court room last night for the purpose of effecting an organization to be known as the Utah Breeders' Association. W. A. Black presided and Ben H. Edridge acted as secretary. A constitution was adopted and a board of directors elected. The committee to be formed.

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Second-The object of this association is to promote the better and easier induction of Utah cattle into the market; to secure and breed of herefords and cattle to increase their numbers and to prevent such legislation as will tend to prevent the importation and the extension of contagious diseases; to incur and sustain the expenses of the Agricultural Fair and to interest other ranchers in the promotion of stock and to incite the agricultural and stockmen to increase their sales and fair, to promote lower reduced rates or free transportation to such as can be exhibited at the annual and regular exhibitions and all similar meetings.

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Fourth—The board of directors shall consist of ten men, to be elected at the annual meeting of the association.

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FEDERATED TRADES COUNCIL.

Report of the Labor Day Committee—Reports from the Unions.

At a meeting of the Federated Trades Council last evening, President Steele presided.

The Labor Day committee reported not having received reports from the Union Pacific, without which the accounts of the day cannot be settled.

The committee on legislation reported drafting several bills to be shortly presented to the council for consideration.

A special committee reported having arranged with William Jackson Armstrong for a lecture for the benefit of the council next Monday evening in Central Hall, on "The Masses and the Millions," or, "The Labor Issues of the Day."

An amendment to the constitution relative to the duties of the treasurer was proposed.

Another amendment was about to give up the lease of the hall. President Steele was instructed to leave it for the Federated Trades.

The Federated Union asked for admission to the Federated Trades, and the secretary was requested to communicate with them.

The Federated Union notified the council of their withdrawal from the Federated Trades because the president of the council had a speech on Labor Day, and because of dissatisfaction with the Federated Union's handling of Windham's machinery accident.

W. H. Marshall of the Lathers Union was appointed to fill a vacancy on the legislative committee.

After the meeting the council adjourned for a meeting of "state," also that "state" houses were writing all over the country for men, and asked that the Denver could be communicated.
