Life of Joseph Smith. Continued from 6th volume of the "Times and Seasons," page 1102. Minutes of a Council held at Kirtland, Aug. 11, 1834.

Resolved, that after hearing from the mouths of some, that a suspicion rested upon their minds relative to the conduct of our president, as regards his honesty and godly walk...

Kirtland, Ohio, Aug. 27, 1834. BROTHER SYLVESTER SMITH.—Whereas complaint has been made to me, by counsellor Sidney Rigdon, setting forth that you have been violating the laws of the church of the Latter-Day Saints, you are therefore, hereby notified...
