

## PROVO WILL HOLD AN EISTEDDFOD.

Sons of St. David Society of Sco-  
field Take the Initiative.

PRIZES AGGREGATE \$700.

Dates are July 16 and 17—The Contest  
Program and Conditions—Cam-  
brians at Saltair July 15.

The Salt Lake Cambrian association, under whose auspices two successful Eisteddfods have been given in this city, at a cost not far short of \$12,000, will have to look well to its laurels, otherwise some other city in Utah may wrest them from it.

Lagan entered the field a year ago last March, and now Provo comes out with the announcement that a "Grand Eisteddfod" will be held within her gates on Monday and Tuesday, the 16th and 17th of July.

The promoters of the affair are citizens of Scofield, Carbon county, who have organized themselves into a society known as the "Sons of St. David." Under the auspices of this society the July Eisteddfod will be given. That it is composed of enterprising citizens seems to be a self-evident fact, judging from the excellent program prepared and the big sum of money offered in prizes. It will take at least \$1,000 to bring the society out even. Of this amount about \$700 will be distributed among successful contestants, and the balance, of course, goes toward paying the incidental expenses.

The contest program embraces twenty-eight numbers, and includes a grand choral competition for a choir of not less than sixty mixed voices, nor more than eighty. The first prize is \$200 and a gold medal to the leader of the winning chorus; second prize, \$100. Four sessions in all will be held, two each day. On Wednesday, July 18, the day following the second day's Eisteddfod, the Cambrians will hold forth at Saltair. This excursion will be under the direction of the Salt Lake Cambrian association, and will be largely attended by Welsh folks from all parts of the State.

THE CONTEST PROGRAM.  
The Provo Eisteddfod program is as follows:

5. Male voice chorus, for a party of less than 20 nor more than 25 voices, "Salor Chorus," by Parry, Pub. by D. O. Evans, prize, silver medal and \$30.
6. Children's choir of not more than 20 nor more than 40 voices, "Storm the Fort of Sin," by W. T. Samuels, Pub. by D. O. Evans, \$25.
7. Female party of not less than 20 nor more than 25, "Sweetest May," by Mrs. D. O. Evans, \$30.
8. Amateur brass band contest, for a band of not less than 12 nor more than 25 instruments, "Fighting Chorus," by Lombardi, Pub. Daynes Music Co., of Salt Lake, \$50.
9. Male quartet, "Night Breeze," by Schubert, Pub. by Diston Music Co., Boston, \$10.
10. Trio, "Tenor, Soprano and Bass," "God be Merciful," by Parry, Pub. by D. O. Evans, \$8.
11. Comic duet, to be selected by the singers, \$5.
12. Duet, baritone and soprano, "What are the Wild Waves Saying," Pub. by D. O. Evans, \$4.
13. Duet, tenor and bass, "Flow Gently Down," by Dr. Parry, Pub. by Evans, \$4.
14. Bass solo, "The Voice of God Creation," by D. O. Evans, \$4.
15. Baritone solo, "The Comrade," by Tom Price, Pub. by D. O. Evans, \$4.
16. Soprano solo, "My Western Home," by E. Stephens, Pub. by Daynes, \$4.
17. Alto solo, "He Sleeps upon Havan's Shore," by Dan Reese, Pub. by D. O. Evans, \$4.

24. Anti-ode, Audi, English or Welsh subject, "Beat" "Mor," not less than 100 lines, chair and \$15.
25. Welsh song, to be selected by the singers; competition for persons over 16 years of age, \$2.
26. Female recitation; to be selected from "Maniac" in Standard Book No. 3, \$3.
27. Male recitation; to be selected by the competitors (comic), \$2.
28. Dialogue (comic); to be selected by the competitors, \$2.
29. An Eisteddfod prize bag, contest, first prize, \$2, second, \$1.

RULES AND CONDITIONS.  
Decision of adjudicators shall be final in each competition. In case of dispute on any one contest the decision of the executive committee shall be final. Author of compositions failing to be present should, if possible, be represented by proxy. Winning compositions to be the property of the society. Prize winners of the contest are expected to take a part in the concert of the Eisteddfod, as shall be arranged by the committee. Competitors may choose their own accompanist. Entries and compositions to be in the hands of the corresponding secretary not later than July 1, 1900.

CHEAP RAILROAD RATES.  
The railroads have agreed to make special rates to Provo on dates of Eisteddfod and the promoters feel assured of a large attendance from all parts of the State.

"These words, said he, could be truthfully spoken of Dr. Wise. A man, said he, who was always active and energetic, and devoted his whole life to the broadening and liberalizing of Judaism. No man did so much as he towards uniting the American Hebrew congregations, and the founding upon a permanent basis of the Hebrew Union college, a college for the education of the American rabbi for American congregations.
