Death of Mrs. Smyth.—The hopes that were entertained that Mrs. Smyth, who was shot by her evilly disposed husband, on Tuesday last, would survive, were to have been ill-fortuned. The unfortunate lady was taken in the ranch where the tragedy occurred, to Fisco, on Friday morning, where she peacefully expired on the evening of the same day.
Petty Thiefs.—Yesterday afternoon several gentlemen tied their horses and vehicles up while they attended to business in the Tabernacle, and when they returned they discovered that somebody had stolen their horses. No More Shooting.—Different parties have of late been practicing shooting in Liberty Park, to the great danger and annoyance of people who go there for legitimate recreation. Mayor Jennings gives notice that all persons discharging firearms in that public pleasure resort in future will be prosecuted to the full extent of the law in such cases made and provided. We are pleased to note this action of the Mayor, as it was decidedly needed.
Hurt his Ankle.—On Sunday last as W. E. Bassett, Esq., was riding a horse from Logan to Mendon, the animal stumbled and fell in such a way as to bring one of Mr. Bassett's feet under him. The foot and ankle were severely strained and injured. After the fall the horse ran a short distance, and then stopped, leaving Mr. Bassett on the ground. The latter managed to approach and mount the animal again, but the injury to his foot led him to return home to Logan. He has not been able to be out since the unfortunate accident until yesterday.—Logan Leader.
A Contemptible Trick.—The 300 men shipped from Denver some time since to work on the Oregon Short Line R. R., arrived here last Tuesday. It is stated that not more than one-sixth of them remained to report themselves ready for work, notwithstanding they were forwarded at the company's expense. It is reported to be true, the rest of the men were sent back to their respective destinations in the northwest, at the expense of the railroad company.

IN MEMORIAM.
In Provo City, May 24th, 1882, Amanda M., relict of the late John P. McEwen, died at the age of 56 years. Deceased was the daughter of the late Bishop Isaac Higbee, and with her father's family, shared the trials and privations of the Saints in Missouri and Illinois; came to Utah in 1848 and went to Provo in 1860. Deceased was a lady of most amiable disposition, the impress of whose nobility of character is left upon a large family, all of whom have the respect of the community. She not only exhibited those motherly traits which render the true woman so attractive in her own family circle, but she and her afflicted were the objects of her tender solicitude whenever they were within the reach of her ministrations. She was a Latter-day Saint in the true acceptance of the title. Peace to her ashes.
The Bicycle Tournament.—Among the many and varied attractions that are tempting the good people of Salt Lake City to venture beyond the suburbs to-morrow, there is probably not one that will surpass in interest the array of amusements presented by Spring Lake Farm, popularly known as Calder's Farm. The ride through the green fields, the music, the dancing, the swings and the games, the scenery about the beautiful lake, the boats and the bicycles, will all contribute to make it a scene of surpassing interest on Decoration Day. Among the various amusements presented and kept ready to prove most attractive from its novelty, than that part of the programme supplied by the Salt Lake Bicycle Club. Such members of the club as can get away are expected to meet at 5 o'clock this afternoon at the residence of Capt. D. L. Davis, whence they will proceed to Calder's.
The events for to-morrow will consist of two principal races, one mile race and one five mile race, with expert and fancy riding sandwiched between them, as follows:
First—Mile race for gold and silver medals, to start 2 p. m., riding start, to run in three or four, according to entries; best two in three, mile heats.
Second—Expert riding to commence at 3 p. m. First on a mile race, without handles; second, slow race, 1-16 mile, last in to win; third, side saddle race, 1 mile; fourth, standing mount from step; fifth, standing mount from pedestal; sixth, dismount over handle, right and left; seventh, vaulting to saddle from side, with bicycle standing, to start after mounting; ninth, vaulting from rear while in motion; tenth, vaulting from rear while standing; eleventh, pick up handkerchief from ground while in motion; twelfth, riding, legs over handles and arms folded; thirteenth, lying down on saddle while in motion; fourteenth, riding, standing in saddle, 14th, sitting on bicycle, while not in motion, etc.
The person doing the greatest number of tricks, with the greatest ease, will be awarded a prize.
Third—Five mile race, with a prize for the winner.
Four prizes are offered to the members and will in all probability be hotly contested for by the participants. These prizes consist of the \$50 gold medal, which has already been described; second, a beautiful silver medal, relieved with gold ornamentation, both very creditable specimens of home manufacture, produced by Swann Bros. of this city; third, a pair of corrugated rubber-soled bicycle shoes; fourth, a fine Arab saddle bicycle spring. In all, the prizes will amount to about \$75. We hope Mr. Calder will be prepared to accommodate all who contemplate calling on him.
