ONE of SIX Years Arrested for Incendiarism.

Sixty in Nebraska's Cell-Death From Exposure—W. H. Irwin, of Omaha.

Pocatello, Idaho, Tribune: An officer sent from Idaho Tuesday morning, having in charge one W. H. Irwin, who claims to have committed the crime of killing his wife last week and then shot himself two days later, paid two dollars for his release, which he passed on Felix Van Damm, and the other on Hay Ken, the intelligent capitalist who runs the Minnesota Restaurant. These checks were given him first. No check was given to Irwin, but they proved to be good, as Mr. Irwin had no funds here to pay them. He was taken before Judge Chapman but waived bail and went to jail pending the action of the district attorney.

Two incendiaries, who within a block of each other were started Saturday afternoon in Sacramento, Cal., and it was owing to the promptness of the fire department and the fact that there was no wind, that there was not a disastrous conflagration. The information of the writer, who has the information correct, is now in jail. He is a little old, has loose breeches, about 6 years old, and, having a face as round as a baby, someone set fire to his clothes. He denies that he did it himself, but says he did it because he was carrying a dynamite bag. The woman said it was a little boy named Ray Gould, whose parents lived on Fourth street, between Q and R. Acting upon this information the police made a search, but could not find the boy. He cried so hard that it was difficult to get anything definite out of him, but from what he does say it is evident he knows all about the fire. He denies that he did it himself, but says he did it because he was carrying a dynamite bag. Hay's father is a brokenhearted man, and the child's parents are wild with grief over the charges against him.

A interesting scene occurred in the county of Marin, Cal., when Major Clegg, a member of the Legislature, went to their cousin and brother, John and Oscar, accused of the murder of Hastings. The girls live at El Dorado, and came Saturday morning with their mother to see the trial. There was also a mississippi in the Hastings' trial at Los Angeles. When they entered the jail the condemned men were seated on a couch, and the sisters rushed to their arms crying in agony. The mother died of heart trouble, but the daughters are still living. The fifteen-year-old girl was a ward who spoke. Tears came into Major Clegg's eyes, but Clegg was unmoved. The white-haired missionary sank to her knees at the feet of both, and, after a few moments of silent prayer, began to weep long and fervently. The history of the Cummings family is a sad one. The mother died when the boys were very young, twelve years ago. The father died when they were very young. John and Oscar lived out for all classes of work and fell into bad company. Clegg, the elder sister, had never who was very devoted and wanted to marry her, but she would not hear of it. She resolved to devote her life to the care of her aged father and the younger children. The family was so poor that friends wanted the two younger boys to go to work, but John and Oscar would not allow it. They wanted the family kept together, and worked hard to do so, this estimation for the family being about the only remaining feature of the murderer's life.

Bear Lake, Idaho: On Friday night a man was found dead in one of the houses. Father Valentine, who has this year past been in charge of the property at Fort Cameron, came down on Friday last. He intended to wait here until the man was identified. On his way he called at the home of George and left them some time before dark. He then called at a neighbor's house, and remained a short time. He got started on the road, where he was found, which showed that he had been walking. The folks at the fort thought the gentleman had stayed at his son's place in town, and his son supposed no father ate at home long before the war began. But it is known that man has a terrible experience that night. The wind blew a gale, it was cold and dark. From indications the old gentleman wandered up to where the house was, and lay down. It was near this point that he was found. Marks in the dirt show where he had rolled around for the hat. In his search he doubtless got lost, and the wind blew him in a southerly direction. He lay there. He had not been aware of falling right into the broken neck of the wire. As he did not get home Saturday, the folks at the fort became anxious concerning him and began a search. All day Saturday they searched, making the bushes wet but no trace could be found. Final play was suspected. Sunday a company of riders took up the hunt and near and far they searched, but still no trace was found. The company was greatly interested, there being nearly seventy-five horses now on the ground. The same ground that had before been broken up and made more examined, but with greater care. Here and there were found marks and evidences of the old gentleman having crawled along the ground, having found shelter.

He death has unfortunately come quietly and without a struggle. The remains were at once forwarded to the state examination board, Dr. E. C. and Dr. P. acting coroner, with Alfred Ross, Dr. H. DeMoss, and Fred Harris as coroners. The old gentleman's pants were worn out at both knees, and the flesh was bare from the knee to the bone; this happened to have been done while crawling. What the old man did during his stay night, locate his shelter, how he got his last long sleep, will ever remain a mystery. Father Valentine was a simple, quiet, weatherbeaten man, about 60 years of age, and his native land, he said, was Ireland. He had a wife, seven living children, and several other relatives and a number of acquaintances.
