RETURN TO CONSTANTINOPLE.
ANOTHER LETTER FROM A MISSIONARY.

CONSTANTINOPLE, May 6, 1860.

Dear Brother.—On the 26th of April we met an English steamer at Beirut in a circumstance which saved us six days of our journey here. The prince of Cyprus, Rhodes and Patras, was noted as the place of banishment of John the Baptist. At Tschink we saw the little ship, a small boat down the Dardanelles to Kun-Kale, from whence we set our course for the plains of Troy to the Scythian encampment at which made world renowned by Homer's imitation. Kun-Kale probably occupies the site of the ancient city of the Trojans, the rich lands of the Trojan plains are carelessly cultivated. The sheep are scattered upon the ground, the stranger and the ox to take a look at the passer by. The Turkish dogs here are trained to hunt, and are as fierce as those of Greece and Palestine. At the point of a small plateau extending into the sea, in the base of the mountains, Schileme, stands the ruined ruins which he claims to be those of ancient Troy. His claims, though not supported by any definite proof, are of some importance accepted as sufficient for historical researches. We will, however, contest the point as an open question, and accept it as all right of course, and would feel somewhat indignant, I suppose, if we had not been on the site of ancient Troy. The Turk, by the way, is a good fellow, frank and honest, and has a good heart.

After climbing up and down, wandering around in the trenches and gazing at the few remaining scattered relics for a couple of hours, we wended our way "on shore" near some flouring mills and obtained a bed and bench in a bar house. There are several advantages derived from such slumbers. One never over-sleeps, and staggers 5 or 6 miles in the same position. Besides the average bench is too high and causes one to sit in it one hour. Looking into what are called the higher spheres, though in truth a good backache is pretty high, the son of George Eliot in fiction, Mrs. Brown in poetry, Ross Bonham in painting, and Mr. Walker in modern romance, are all fine finds. We took an English freight steamer over the Marmora to Constantinople. The captain, however, could take some passengers on board. "We can't pay," replied, "if you sleep on deck." We had slept in worse places than "on deck," and had an answer in less than a second. We reached Constantinople on the morning of the 2nd inst. after very early hours. It was time to rouse our countrymen from slumber made sweet by dreams of rest, roses, men, something greater than life, hints of art, invention or song.—*Philosophical Times.*
