Alarming Spread of the Great Forest Conflagrations.

INKY DARKNESS IN PLACES.

The Loss of Life and Property-The Work of Destruction Unabated And Spreading.

Tacoma, Sept. 12 .- The nearest disastrous fire is at Elma, 60 miles southwest of here, where six large lumber mills and ten houses have been destroyed.

At 9 o'clock all wires to Gray's Harbor country went down and no word can be received from Elma or Aber-

About 11 o'clock a telegram reported Enumciaw, in King county, on the main lice of the Northern Pacific, east, in great danger. The town appeals for a fre-engine and hose, but, as many small brush fires are burning on Tacoma's outksirts, none can be spared. The town of Bucoda, in Thurston county, 45 miles south of here, was in inky darkness at 11 o'clock this fore-

Reports from Shelton state that nearly all of the mills in Mason county are on fire. The town of Matlock, that county, is in imminent danger of total

destruction. Sixteen miles from Olympia the Bor-deaux string of camps, the Black Hill district, are in great danger. Forty men have gont on horseback to rescue women and children. In Tecome heavy darkness settled In Tacoma heavy darkness settled dewn this morning. Boats cannot pass the narrows on account of darkness. At Olympia the electric plant has shut down, and at noon it was as dark shut down, and at noon. as the blackest night. Forest fires of the most serious na-ture are pressing upon every side of Enumclaw. Every team is being pressed into service.

AN INTERESTING DOCUMENT

#### The Last Eruption Greatly Exceeded In Extent the First One- Electrical Liluminations.

Fort de France, Island of Martinique, Saturday, Sept. 6 .- Prof. Angelo Heilprin, president of the Philadelphia Geographical society, who is in Martinique in the interests of the National Geographical society, has made the following report on the recent eruptions of

Mont Pelee: The scene of destruction in the last eruption of Mont Pelee far surpasses in extent that of May 8, when St. Pierre was destroyed and includes the broad area lying between Macouba and Carbet, and involves Haute Tours de Bourden, Basse Pointe, Morne Balai and Ajoupa Boulion, where alone upwards of 300 persons were killed, as well as Morne Rouge, with a death last of probably not less than 1,100 persons; Morne Capot and the heights somewhat this side of Fon-da St. Denis, the blast, however, leaving the last named place untouched Great cinders fell also over the region of Grand Riviere, and Precheur is cov-

ered deep with ashes. In Carbet the ashes lie one foot deep and nearly the same amount covers the ruins of St. Pierre. All of Morne Rouge, with the exception of about four houses and the beautiful church, has been swept to the ground and the greater part of the town has been burned up. At Ajoupa Boul-lion, where one half of the town has been prostrated, there is no trace of fire of any kind.

The destructive blast, instead of con-fining itself to a section of area, as was the case during the first eruption, was distributed radially, crossing the low summit of the volcano near the knob of Morne Jacob and skipping zones between its rays.
