An early winter is generally predicted. The temperature fell sudpredicted. The temperature fell sud-denly to 34 degrees last night which is

The British have abandoned their camp on the plains to the southwest and with the return of the Pao Ting Fu expedition will put their men in buildings for the winter. The bulk of the German force is being rapidly sent forward to Pekin but those still here are in tents and the scarcity of lum-her probably will prevent the season

ber probably will prevent the erec-tion of winter barracks. The inadequacy of the railway facili-ties is a source of much embarrassment.

As indicated in the dispatches of the Associated Press, there is little likeli-hood that the road from Yang Tsun to Pekin will be in operation this winter, consequently the allies are depending on the river for transportation. on the river for transportation. The Americans, fearing that the rapid fall in the Pei Ho will impede navigation, are using wagon trains to rush sup-plies to Pekin. They are the only force equipped with wagons and animals. General Humphrey, the chief quarter-master, is sending four mule teams as fast as possible and the bulk of the supplies for the American garrison at Pekin is already under way or safely at Pekin is already under way or safely stored in the capital. Little progress has been made by the allied forces, who

with the exception of the Russians, will maintain a large garrison at Pekin. As a result, the opinion is gaining ground that a portion of the present estimate of troops may be forced to It is probable that the Pekin railway will be restored to its

The schooner arrived at Komali, in the Admiralty group, just after the murder of Herman Matseke, the trading agent therde. This was on August 29th. The Mascotte dropped anchor in

In or about 1847, the petition was an-swered in the case of the deceased, and he embraced the Gospel, with a joyful heart, in the city of Edinburgh. From that day he took and maintained a po-sition in the front rank as a zealous and fearless preacher, proclaiming the latter-day message in public halls, private houses, or on the street corners, frequently subjected to jeers, insuits, threats and actual violence, but he

never wavered. He came to Utah in 1861, and settled in Morgan, being one of the pioneers of that section. When that Stake was that section. When that Stake was organized he was set apart as coun-selor to Bishop Turner, which position he held until 1879, when he was appointed to the office of president of the High Priests' quorum of the Stake, which position he retained until his demise, He was likewise ordained a Patriarch. In these and other offices he manifested his characteristic ac-tivity and faithfulness, a bright exam-

ple to all who came in contact with him Besides his ministry at home, he re

sponded to a call to go on a mission to his native land in 1874. He diligently and honorably filled it and was successful in adding a number of converts to the Church.

The three wives of Father Hogs pre-ceded him to the spirit world. He leaves a large number of faithful chil-dren and a host of friends to cherish his memory and emulate his virtues. The funeral service was held in t Morgan meeting house on Tuesday, No vember 13th. The people of the tow were in attendance almost en masse and the stores were closed from respec to the departed.
