



FOR THE TEETH.

Mix one ounce of charcoal, as much quinine as will lie on a dime, five grains of magnesia and a few drops of attar of roses. Both a soft and a hard brush should be used and the upper teeth brushed from the top downward, the lower teeth from the bottom upvard. The inside of the teeth requires be brushed in the same way. sides the usual brushing twice a day the teeth should be brushed with soap three or four times a week. 


