Ausworing a request for an expres-tion of the views of the government concorning China's proposal that the Manejurian questions be referred to The Hague, the foreign office today gave out the following carefully word-ed statement

ed statement "Several questions between Japan and China of more or less importance, with reference to Manchurta, remain unadjusted. Some are complicated, but all readily could be made to yield to the appointive process of give and take.

Take, "Japan, fully appreciating the ad-variages of reducing all causes of misandecostanding from her relations with her neighbors, made proposals to China booking to the final settlement of entretanding differences. These pro-posals were framed in a spirit of com-pletention and concillation, and were in no sense an ultimatum. Japan ex-posited that the terms offered would serve as a basis of negotiation or as points of departure for reciprocal con-gessions and accommodations. ng and accommodations.

"China at first apparently accent Japan's friendly overturesc in the spi in which they are tendered, but milign influences were permitted to provail, and without discussing the que tions or making any counter proposals. China categorically rejected Japan's offer and suggested recourse to The

"In adopting this extraordinary "Ourse, China is guilty not only of slight discourtesy to Japan, but has disregarded one of the expressed provi-sions of The Hague convention, and has completely reversed the usual course of procedure. The government has get its face against in-dulgence in the delights of the "dope pipe" and prohibited the importation of opium of anything less than medicinal purity after April 1. That was bad enough, but the hustling importers rushed their orders to the orient and nearly a million dollars' worth of the drug was landed here a few days ago and safely stored in the custom house and bonded warehouses, in time, it was supposed, to evade the new regulation. Now the authorities at Washington have instructed Collector Stratton not to allow any opium to leave his posses-Port Stratton from Washington.
