Medill, the veteran editor of the
Chicago Tribune, in Saturday's pa-
per, rebukes the Wednesday-night
San Francisco meeting for going
beyond its tribute to the dead. It
says the meeting was a lesson from
the Central Pacific, and tried to de-
stroy two newspapers, mediums of
public opinion, and centers of news,
which did not agree with its own.

This is not fair play. Taking refuge
behind a dead man to assail a living
one has never been counted the ex-
treme of sanity. The article
adds that criticism of persons and
events by the press cannot be suc-
cessfully combated by mob violence,
and that the only way to silence
disrespectful criticism is to dis-
prove them.

The Washington Tribune also de-
nounces the attempt to vindicate
Ransom by "underwriting" to hip-
pothecate the property of the Central
Pacific Railroad. It says that the
cause for which they are now abus-
ing the name of a dead man is a
cause which they have never been
able to win in the open market-
place.

ous other well-known eastern jour-

the indecent and indecorous
newspaper by which they were
attacked.
