WASHINGTON, 28 .- About half the class of the signal service men under-going a course of instruction at Fort Myer, to be completed in January, are being tried by court-martial on the charge of insubordination. The men felt that they were being unjustly and harshiy treated by their instructor,

profanity, indiscriminately calling them names not to be repeated, they resolved to make an effort for relief. A meeting of the class was held, which resulted in a petition to the chief signal officer, setting forth their griev-snce and appealing for relief. The petition was answered by an order for court-martialing of all the men who had signed the petition, on the ground of insubordination.

General Hazen said to-night the men General Hazen said to-night the men were being court martialed, not for expressing their grievances, but for holding a meeting and combining for that purpose, which he said was al-most equal to mutiny. It is expected that the court will be over to-morrow and the findings be submitted to Gen. Hazen. The subject will not come before the war department un-less there should be a sentence of dis-
