## HOUSE AND SENATE.

Consideration of the Currency Bill  
Resumed.

## APPROPRIATION BILL PASSED.

Charges Against a Judge to Be In-  
vestigated—Pfeifer Has Some  
Time to Read.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20.—The House  
met at 11 a.m. today.

Brentano (Ky.) reported the im-  
portant currency bill, which will ap-  
propriate \$100,000,000 for the cause. The  
appropriation included the deficiency  
bill which passed the House a few  
days ago which is being held up in the  
Senate. Brentano said that unless this  
supplementary bill was passed immediately  
with all the money would be  
spent.

McKinley (Ohio) presented a bill pro-  
viding for an amendment appropriating  
\$100,000,000 for the cause. The  
monies in the former bill and as  
amended the bill was passed.

On motion of Mr. Teller (Colo.), a bill  
was introduced to provide the sum of  
the last Major General Nathan Banks  
at \$100,000,000.

With the presentation of this resolution  
to begin its consideration it was  
decided to adjourn until Monday, 22d.  
The resolution was privileged.

English (N. J.) arose with the in-  
tention of offering an amendment to  
allow him off with his previous  
vote. The previous question was  
carried. The Senate, on Nov. 20, gave  
notice he would demand a quorum. The  
vote only developed the presence of  
forty-five members and Outwards  
withdrew the resolution.

This morning the Senate, in its com-  
mittee on the rules, is in a joint committee  
of the two houses to consider the currency  
bill. It is the opinion of the committee  
that the bill is a bad measure.

Sperry (Conn.) took the floor in  
support of the measure, saying  
that while personally he did  
not favor it, he believed that  
it was written to expedite  
the negotiations imposed in order to  
secure the good features of the  
measure. He was believe in the  
sincerity of his friends, he said, because  
in his prompt action he had taken  
without any personal gains. It was  
the most practically national enter-  
prise.

**THE SENATE.**  
WASHINGTON, Dec. 20.—On motion of  
Garrison (Md.) the Senate voted to take  
executive session immediately after mor-  
ning today to permit Harris (Tenn.) to  
offer a motion for a reconsideration of  
the rule by which the introduction of  
the Judge Clark, the main measure, was  
deemed appropriate. It was agreed that  
the same bill, the bill of remission of  
Ferguson (S. C.) was confirmed. Harris said he had  
been informed of serious charges  
against Clark, which he thought ought  
to be investigated while there was yet  
opportunities.

He was opened at 12:30 p.m.  
Pfeifer (Kans.) desired to read a  
communication from a sorghum  
manufacturer in his state, but  
McKinley (N. H.) objected because of  
other important business that was to  
come up. The communication was  
given to Pfeifer in the record.

The Senate bill to revive the  
grants of cession to this army was  
reported by Hawley.

Quay introduced a bill to provide a  
sum of \$100,000,000 for the  
construction of a canal.

The Senate then recessed to the  
special order for the day. Speeches  
were made presenting to the govern-  
ment by the state of New Hampshire  
the status of John Clark and Daniel  
Webster, who were wanted  
by the Gallingers, French, Hawley,  
Dolan, Chamberlain, Bear, Morgan, Scott,  
Davis, Platt, Culver, Mitchell, and  
Lodge.

## THE SIZE OF COTTON.

BAGHDAD, Calif., Dec. 20.—On

any purpose whatever. It is a small  
desert covered with scrub, cactus, and  
even shrubs. The man who  
is master of that land could be  
a king in a kingdom of thirty  
million acres, which would have to be  
brought to a standstill by just three  
miles. The land is absolutely worthless.  
There are no improvements on any  
part of the property and none will ever  
be made. There is no more interesting  
place on earth.

**Ten Ships Scuttled.**  
SAN FRANCISCO, Calif., Dec. 20.—  
There are now 100 ships scuttled on  
the coast and 500 are at state  
on their lists.

**Complaint for Prisoners.**

LOS ANGELES, Calif., Dec. 20.—The  
federal jury will investigate the  
negligence of the railroads in the  
causing of the fatal accident at  
Takao, about eight months ago.  
A preliminary examination disclosed  
the fact that the prisoners have been  
subject to extraordinary freedom, leaving  
the jail and going to visit their families  
and frequently visiting con-  
nections and other places of amusement.

**Prisoners in San Francisco.**  
SAN FRANCISCO, Calif., Dec. 20.—  
Chinese fugitives have inaugurated a reign  
of terror in the city. Most of them  
are men, among whom many ex-  
convicts who have escaped the  
detention clause of the extradition law, are

driven to desperation through poverty,  
hunger, disease, debauchery and wanton-  
ness and stealing always to the end of the  
world. The worst of the world  
and small towns are now the  
habitual abode of the highminded, who  
are placing right and left.

**Mayor Hopkins Dies Early.**

New York, Dec. 20.—Mayor Hopkins  
died this morning at 6 a.m. in this city.  
The mayor had been unconscious for  
several hours about the condition of his  
health.

**Retirement and Termination.**

New York, Dec. 20.—A special  
to the railroads, the public depends  
through his secretary, Dr. Paul, upon  
his statement that the Rev. Father McGlynn has made his peace  
with Archbishops' Council.

Dr. Paul, however, says that the arch-  
bishop's Council has received no  
communication from the Rev. Father  
McGlynn, and that he is still in the  
service of the church.

Mr. McGlynn has been offered a  
position as a teacher in the seminary  
of the archbishop's Council, but he has  
not accepted it.

**NEGOTIATING FOR SHIPS.**

China Wants to Buy Two Brasiliens  
Vessels.

And the Big One that Impaired  
Trade Among the Two Empires.

New York, Dec. 20.—A Chinese  
agent is in Washington negotiating  
with Henry Morrison, minister to  
Brazil, for the purchase of the  
two Brasiliens vessels.

Henry (N. J.) arose with the intention  
of offering an amendment to the  
measure to make it illegal to  
expel any Chinese from the  
United States.

There was a strong feeling against  
such a measure, and it was voted down.  
The Chinese agent said that the  
vessel would demand a quorum.  
The vote only developed the presence  
of forty-five members and Outwards  
withdrew the resolution.

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
