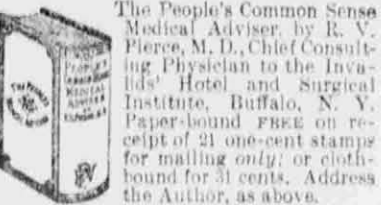

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DR. YOUNG ON PRESENT WATER SHORTAGE

Salt Lake City, Utah, Aug. 18. To the Honorable Mayor and City Council and General Public and Citizens of Salt Lake City—We are confronted with a somewhat serious problem in the scarcity of our water supply. We need not enter into a discussion as to the reasons why. Possibly we have all been more or less wasteful of the aqueous fluid in the immediate past for the reason that our supply has been so bountiful that a need of correct system of economy has not been fairly worked out in the minds of the water consumers. Now, we must immediately meet the question in the most prudent manner in order to prevent much suffering in the future. The first thing, then, that I have to suggest is that every citizen constitute himself or herself a committee of one to make an inventory of his water in every home and on every premises not one drop of water shall be allowed to go to waste; that the following request of Mayor Morris shall be honored strictly in the observance thereof; that the sprinkling of lawns shall be limited to two days of the week, and that every citizen will honestly see to it that the time allowed for sprinkling shall be limited as directed by our chief officer; that the watering of vehicles, both at livery and private stables, be discontinued if it need be, entirely prohibited for the present; that within the next 24 hours standpipes be erected along the main laterals of the Salt Lake and Jordan canals and that all water used for sprinkling of streets be taken from the standpipes above mentioned; that all hotels, livery stables, breweries, offices, depots, schools and other public institutions be prohibited from running open taps, either by night or by day, for any purpose whatsoever, and that a violation of this rule considered a misdemeanor and dealt with accordingly.

It would, in my estimation, be an irreparable wrong and result in very serious consequences to omit sprinkling of our principal thoroughfare, but I fear a greater disaster would follow the continued taking of the water for street sprinkling from the city water mains, hence, for the welfare and immediate well being of our city I earnestly request the mayor and city council to insist upon the adoption of the above measures. Also that the laborers connected with our street improvements, where any excavation is to be filled, either large or small, that such laborers employed by contractors be prohibited through said contractor, from turning in a stream of water from any private or city water main as has been the custom in the past, and as is the custom today, for the purpose of making the earth with which the workmen are filling up the trench or opening, after having laid their conduit or water pipes or sewer pipes. Today there is at least 100,000 gallons of water wasted in this needless manner, and should at once be prevented. If it is necessary to pack the dirt in these excavations and trenches it should be done by tamping and thus prevent a needless waste of water at this time, when every drop should be conserved for the benefit of the public.

There is one more item I desire to mention, as it is so inseparably connected with the health conditions of the city. The gathering of garbage and manure and delivering the same to the city dumping grounds or crematory, these garbage haulers, some of private conveyances and others employed by the city, many of them haul in old shacks or dilapidated wagons, and in loading pile on the light and filthy garbage and manure as long as the wagon bed will hold while standing in a heaped up condition. The result is that when they start for the depot to dump and go trotting along the principal streets, a constant trail of manure, filth and garbage and disease germs is deposited from these over filled vehicles, thus scattering an unknown quantity of disease germs and the very great detriment of the public health. I suggest as a remedy for this that the garbage hauling be placed under the direction of a local officer, where it properly belongs, and a different record in this matter would soon be made.

Hope that these few hints will be taken very soon. I subscribe myself, Your fellow citizen and your very sincere friend.

LOCAL MARKETS.

The local markets are well supplied with local fruits and produce of all kinds. Utah apples are arriving and are of better quality than heretofore, as growers are learning to take better care of the tree, and the fruit is therefore of better quality. California grapes are scarce on account of the rains, which cut off for the time grape picking, as the fruit would spoil if packed wet. Lemons are scarcer and higher than ever, and wholesale at \$1 and \$2 per case. Utah cabbage is becoming scarce and high in price, as the blight which has so badly damaged the tomatoes and peppers, is taking in the cabbage also. California sweet potatoes are arriving by express of good quality and in good condition. They are better than the North Carolina points, and the demand for them is increasing. Dealers say the Carolina article does not come further west than St. Louis.

The poultry supply is getting short, such is the demand from physicians and restaurants, on account of the tourist trade, and eastern supplies are being sent in here. But the eastern article is not up to the standard of the Utah chicken, which is much preferred. Flocks of broilers are snapped up as fast as they arrive by express or by country route, and good broilers are scarce. There are a few blackberries in town, the tallings of the season. There is a shrinkage of 15 cents on flour, wholesale, but the local market may not be affected for a day or two. There are several additions to the grocery list, including squashes and corn.
