Western Freight Rates Continue to be the Topic in the East.

New York, Sept. 20.-The Times says: The optimistic views of the result of Tuesday's conference of western presi-dents, as expressed by Chairman Jeffery dents, as expressed by Chairman Jeffery on Tuesday, are not generally shared by freight representatives and other railroad men in this city. That the absence from the conference of repre-sentatives of the Northern Pacific was more or less of an Intentional slight, and that it foreboded ill for the future of the St. Paul committee was shown by a statement from President Mellen, of the Northern Pacific.
