single touchdown in each game, and the light Springfield training school team, which has never before been considered as formidable, gave Harvard the worst score she has had for years, holding her to a 3-0 score. Two weeks ago, by playing modern, open, scientific football, the Indians had no trouble in humbling the Cambridge men.

### HARVARD'S WORST SLUMP.

It was last Saturday, however, that Harvard took her worst slump. Her defeat came at the hands of a college which has won before only once in the past decade. Dartmouth relieved many years of defeat by an overwhelming victory, the final score being 22-0 in favor of the New Hampshire team. Except in the first few minutes of play, Harvard was completely outclassed.

Yale, on the other hand, has played consistent ball throughout the entire season. The New Haven team is the only big team in the east that has not met defeat this year. Harvard went down before the tricks of the Indians and the terrific onslaughts by Dartmouth. Princeton bowed to Cornell and Yale; West Point to Cornell and Princeton; Cornell to Penn state; Penn state to Pennsylvania; Pennsylvania to the Indians; the Indians to Carleton; and Michigan to Pennsylvania. Yale is the only team that has a clean record and is considered a considerable doubt concerning her ability to maintain that record if she were to meet Cornell or Penn. It is true that West Point held the New Haven team to a scoreless game. But the fact that the Army was defeated by Princeton, who in turn was beaten by Yale, clearly demonstrates the superiority of the latter. One week after Harvard played an even game with Brown, Yale defeated the same team by the decisive score of 22-0.

For these reasons, the championship has already been conceded to Yale. In spite of the fact that Harvard by pulling together may give the Bulldogs some trouble. This, however, is not likely.

The Amherst-Brown game will probably be won by the latter, as the strong Providence team has made the creditable showing this year. The Army will no doubt redeem themselves today for last year's miserable defeat, but they may expect some trouble for Syracuse has a heavy and powerful team.

### CARLETON VS. CHICAGO.

Notwithstanding the fact that the Indians barely defeated Minnesota by a 12-0 score last Saturday, little trouble is anticipated today in their contest with the stronger Chicago team. It must be remembered that

Carleton met Minnesota after traveling all the way from Cambridge, where they defeated Harvard the week before. This great journey threw them out of condition, so that they were unable to put up their usual game. The past week they have spent in the neighborhood of Chicago and thus will be at a disadvantage when they lineup against the Maroons today.

The main interest in the east is being directed toward the Penn-Cornell game to be played on Franklin field on Thanksgiving day. The Yale-Harvard game is conceded to the former. Princeton has finished her season, Michigan has been relegated to the great beyond, and the Army is expected to have an easy time with the Navy. The only game yet to be played, over which the excitement is intense, is the Cornell-Penn. contest.

Cornell certainly has had a successful season. While she failed to round into shape in time to stave off defeat at the hands of Penn state, she has since then defeated Princeton and West Point by small margins, and Swarthmore, decisively. The game of last year, which was virtually a defeat for them and a triumph for Pennsylvania.

Cornell must remember, though, that they are coming to meet a very different team this year, one considerably stronger than last year's Red and Blue organization. Penn. fresh from her brilliant victory over the Wolverines, is under an increased coaching staff, working without rest to humble the pride of the Redians. That which will aid Penn. more than anything else is the fact that she plays on Franklin field, where the team will be backed by that great Pennsylvania spirit which has so often before turned defeat into victory and has gone down in college tradition as the spirit of '76.
