WORK AT COMSTOCK.

Mill and Bins Being Rapidly Built With Much Ore in Drifts.

The work of constructing the new mill and ore bins at the Comstock is reported by Mgr, Dusseldorf, who spent sev-eral days at Park City last week, to progressing rapidly. Meanwhile the ore is being piled up in the drifts in such quantities as to make the early com-pletion of the bins imperative.

MAJESTIC'S IMPROVEMENTS.

Smelter and Railroad Building -Lewisville Townsite is Platted.

Work at the Majestic smelter, according to the Beaver News, is progressing rapidly. The foundations for the super-structures and the spur from the Oregon Short Line will be completed in a short time, while the structural iron will soon begin to arrive. The additional trackage for the mine and smelter will approximate six miles. Sampling works and an assay office will be adjuncts to the equipment, while a sectle of land just northwest of the plant has een platted for the new town of Lewis ville. A park and schoolhouse site have been provided for, and substantial growth seems to pervade the Beaver county atmosphere.

INDIANAPOLIS PROMISING.
