LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

The Pyramidal Lecture.—Don't fail to hear Elder C. W. Stagner, in the 15th Ward to-night, in his lecture on the Pulpit, Press and People.

Periodicals.—Dwyer has Leslie's Illustrated for November 29th, and Pack for November 19th. The latter is very funny, and its principal cartoon is a striking sarcasm on medical quackery.

Free Lectures.—Elder J. H. Ward will lecture in the Third Ward Assembly Rooms, on Wednesday evening, Nov. 28th, under the auspices of the Y. M. M. I. A. Subject: True Honor and its Counterfeit.

Hermann To-night.—Hermann, the great professor of the so-called magic art, will open his engagement at the Theatre this evening. He will be assisted by M'Leis Addie, Parisienne, and the Lorettes in their grotesque and comic eccentricities. They will also appear to-morrow evening.

Two Nights Only.—Nellie Boyd and her dramatic combination will open their engagement for two nights only, at the Theatre, Thursday evening, "Fate, or Lost and Won," is announced for that night, and "Engaged" will take the boards on the following evening.

Corrections.—In our article on "Promoting Progress," last evening, the name of Alma Smith, mentioned as one of the defendants in the Potter case, should be William Smith. The name of Alma Eldridge was inadvertently omitted from the names of the accused parties.

Died from his injuries.—Mr. William Lambert, who had his arm badly injured by a threshing machine, at Deseret, about five weeks ago, a notice of which appeared in our columns about that time, died on the 12th inst., at Fillmore, from the effects of the accident. His sister, Mrs. Elizabeth Treador, of the 12th Ward, this city, who was summoned to his bedside, arrived there about half an hour after he had expired. It was thought at one time he would get well, but the shock his system sustained was so severe that he was unable to recover.

Fatal Mishap.—Shortly before six o'clock Sunday evening, a miner named John Creed was killed while at work in the Ontario mine. He and a fellow miner had been drilling at the bottom of a shaft, when Creed started to go up to the level above to obtain some powder. His companion suggested that he ring the bell and wait for the "cage," a means of transit to and from the surface. Creed declined, saying he would climb up the ladder in another compartment. This was the last he was seen of alive. Shortly afterwards, the engineer at the top started the engine, to bring up the cage from where it was resting, a short distance below, when he noticed that something was obstructing its ascent. Some of the men climbing down, found the body of the unfortunate Creed, half inside the cage, lodged between it and the timbers on the side, and quite dead. It is supposed that while climbing up the ladder in the other compartment, he had seen the cage standing opposite an opening, on the other side of the partition, and had just got through the aperture and partially aboard the cage, to go up, when it began moving and crushed him before he could save himself. The body was brought to the city yesterday, and will be buried to-day.

Children's Opera.—Professor A. C. Smith called upon this morning to say that the rumor which has become current that the juveniles under his training have relinquished the idea of producing the "Grand Duchess," is all a mistake. They are making considerable headway in the beautiful masterpiece. The choruses of the opera are pretty well prepared, and the principal soloists are well advanced in their parts, also the rehearsals, which are regularly attended, will soon be transferred to the stage of the Theatre. No pains or expense will be spared to make the performance a success. The services for Colonel Smith have been secured, to drill the Infantry and Cavalry of the Grand Duchesse. A special arrangement of the orchestral parts will be sent for to the East, this week, which alone will cost in the neighborhood of one hundred dollars. Besides the opera of the "Grand Duchess," the little folks are reading H. M. S. "Pinafore," which will be put upon the boards shortly, with new scenery and stage business.

Enquirer Notes.—The East Co-op. shipped 22,000 pounds of baled hay to Jub this week.

This is being floated down the Sevier River, to be used in the construction of the U. S. R. R. extension.

On Tuesday night last, the Co-op. at Cedar Fort was burglarized, and \$500 in cash carried away. No clue to the robbers has yet been obtained.

Last week Ben Minzey was shot and killed by a party who was after him, in the mountains east of Fanguitch. He was driving off a band of horses, when he was overtaken and the matter settled right on the spot, without troubling a judge or jury. Minzey was a disreputable character and was under bonds to appear at the last September term of court for perjury, but he had forfeited his bonds and was keeping out of the reach of his creditors.

Sunday School Review.—The quarterly review of the 17th Ward Sunday School, last Sabbath, is declared, by those who were present, to have been one of the best entertainments of the kind ever witnessed in the Territory. The exercises were varied, consisting of recitations, songs, duets, choruses, answering of questions in concert, etc., and as the nature of the occasion explains, were what had been studied and delivered by the pupils during the preceding three months. There were present as visitors, President John Taylor, Elder Jos. F. Smith, Bishop R. T. Barton, Elders George Goddard, William Willes and several other Sunday school superintendents from various wards, as well as a good attendance of the parents and friends of the students. The occasion reflected much credit upon Supt. J. Dwyer and his efficient corps of teachers and assistants.

Very Ill.—Hon. A. F. Rockwood is said to be lying sick, in a very critical condition. Our informant says that if he does not receive proper aid and nursing, immediate relief, he will soon be past all hope of recovery. We are requested to suggest to the Ladies' Relief Society, if they know of some good person, skilled in waiting on the sick, that they inform Bro. Rockwood's family at once. He is too good and useful a man to be spared from the community.

Burglary in Willard Canon.—A correspondent at Willard City, informs us that some time between the 14th and 21st inst., the house of the Iron Chief Mining Company, in Willard Canon, was broken into and a quantity of giant powder, a pick, shovels and other articles, stolen. The theft was discovered on the 21st by the owners of the house, who had returned after an absence of a few days. Besides the articles stolen, some damage was inflicted on the premises.

New Organization.—The Presidency of the Stake recently met with the Saints of South Jordan Ward and the elders of the 12th Quorum, composed of the elders of the four Jordan wards, and organized a new quorum of elders to be called the 16th quorum of this Stake. The presidency of the new quorum are: Gordon S. Beckstead, President, and Albert Holt and Samuel L. Howard, Counselors.

The Charge Ignored.—The only case disposed of in the District Court, this morning, was that of a boy named Frederick Leonard, charged with obtaining money under false pretenses. The grand jury having ignored the charge and refused to find an indictment, the defendant was discharged.

Social Dance.—A party will be given to-morrow evening in the Fifth Ward School-house, commencing at seven o'clock. Andrews' quadrille band furnishes the music and a good time may be expected.
