

COMMANDER PEARY AND NORTH POLE

National Geographic Society
Practically Endorses Him as
A Discoverer of It.

SUB-COMMITTEE CONVINCED.

Public Statement of Findings of the
Society Will be Made
Wednesday.

Washington, Nov. 1.—Commander
Robert E. Peary practically was en-
dorsed as a discoverer of the pole by
the National Geographic society today.

Every indication indicates that
Peary's personal statement before the
sub-committee of the society today con-
vinced its members that he had set foot
on the top of the world. The explorer
has been invited to deliver the first of
his public lectures before the society
here on Nov. 12, and it was pointed out
tonight that had the proofs been open
to the slightest question he never would
have been asked to appear.

It was announced at the home of
Rear Admiral C. H. Chester, retired,
that a public statement of the findings
of the society probably will be forth-
coming Wednesday. The rapidly in-
creasing interest in Peary's claim is
taken to mean that there is no differ-
ence among the three experts
Peary declined positively to discuss
his testimony before the committee.

"There is nothing that I can say," he
declared, "all that I have to explain or
elucidate was given to the sub-com-
mittee of the Geographic society this
afternoon. I do not know what those
gentlemen will do with it and naturally
I will not discuss that point."

It was evident from his manner that
the explorer was satisfied what the ver-
dict would be.

For more than two hours members of
the sub-committee interrogated and
cross-examined him. They already had
made a close study of his data.

Upon request of the society Peary
forwarded all of his memoranda to it
a few days ago. This morning he
promptly turned the papers over to the
board of managers which in turn
named a sub-committee of investiga-
tion, consisting of Rear Admiral C. H.
Chester, O. H. Pinnau, of the coast
and geodetic survey, and Henry Gannett,
chairman of the United States Geograph-
ical board. These are regarded
by the society as the best fitted
scientists in the United States to pass
upon Peary's documents.

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TEMPORARY INSANITY IN BUSINESS TRANSACTION

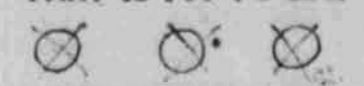
New York, Nov. 2.—By proving that he

Paterson, N. J., Nov. 2.—The names

from the polling list here, because
an investigation showed that the ad-
dresses were cemeteries and church
yards. Four arrests have been made.

ECONOMIC CONDITIONS IN CUBA MOST FLATTERING

Havana, Nov. 1.—The Cuban congress
convened today, the session of both
houses being devoted to the receiving
of the president's message.

President Gomez declared the econ-
omic conditions could not be more flat-
tering.

The message refers to important rail-
road extensions in Oriente province, the
opening of large districts for cultivation
and the increased demand for labor,
and recommends that congress support
this by encouraging immigration and
establishing agricultural loan institu-
tions.

The condition of the treasury is con-
sidered satisfactory.

The last eight months shows in-
creased receipts amounting to \$1,570,393
over the corresponding period of last
year. When the treasury was turned
over to the government, Jan. 25, 1909, it
contained \$2,685,228, with obligations
amounting to \$1,404,556. Receipts since
then amount to \$2,439,469, making \$23-
124,644. Expenditures reported, \$27,689-
352, leaving in the treasury on Sept. 30,
a balance of \$1,035,261.

By pursuing a course of severe econ-
omy, the president says the country
will soon wipe out the obligations left
by the government by intervention.

President Gomez calls attention to the
determination of the Cuban people
by several European countries, notably
France, which contemplates an increase
in duty of 30 per cent on Cuban tobacco
and recommends that congress re-
form the tariff, fixing maximum and
minimum rates at the discretion of the
executive, which would place in his
hands a formidable weapon of economic
force. He recommends an appropriate
law to keep up the great system of
highways recently completed.

WILL HAVE LOBBY IN WASHINGTON

Deep Waterways Convention Will
Send 500 to "Demand" Deep-
ening of the Mississippi.

RATHER HARD TO SWALLOW.

Old Fashioned Rebel Yell Was Given
And Resolution Adopted With
A Whoop.

New Orleans, Nov. 1.—Adopting
President Taft's suggestion that the
time for oratory was passed, the Lake-
to-the-Gulf Deep Waterways conven-
tion tonight decided to send 500 lobby-
ists to Washington, to demand that
Congress deepen the Mississippi river.

A resolution to that effect, offered by
David R. Francis of Missouri, was
adopted. It follows:

Resolved, That the president of the
Lake-to-the-Gulf Deep Waterways as-
sociation be requested to appoint 500
delegates from our organization to visit
Washington and to present the proper
committee of Congress and the heads
of our government "should enter
upon a definite policy and plan of wa-
terways development, beginning with
the improvement of the Mississippi and
Illinois rivers as a main trunk of a
great waterway system, in such a way
as to open effective navigation between
the Gulf of Mexico and the Great
Lakes, such main trunk line to be de-
veloped with no disengagement of and
constant reference to the concurrent de-
velopment of the tributaries."

The issuance of popular bonds in
small denominations was urged upon
Congress as a means of paying for the
great undertaking.

Representative D. E. McKinley of
California was one of the speakers at
the afternoon session. He made a spir-
ited argument for improving the in-
land waterways. He came as a doubter,
he said, but was now converted to the
cause.

FATAL QUARREL OVER KILLING OF A DOG

Great Falls, Mont., Nov. 1.—A special
to the Tribune from Stanford reports
the death of Tom King at the hands of
James J. Gass, at the ranch of the
former, 12 miles northwest of Stanford.
Gass and his brother Robert were out
hunting and stopped at King's place
for dinner. While at dinner one of
Gass's dogs stole some meat belonging
to King, and this enraged the latter
that he shot the dog and threatened he
was attacked by James Gass, and died
within a few minutes as a result of the
beating.

The Gass brothers claim that James
only used his fists, but it is believed
by the officers that a rifle was used.
Both of the Gass brothers were ar-
rested and taken to the county jail at
Leavittsburg. The coroner's jury found
that the killing was felonious. King
was 78 years old and had been in
Montana since 1875. He was widely
known and highly respected.

Chicago, Nov. 1.—Porters, cabmen
and waiters are undesirable as jurors,
according to Jury Commissioner William
A. Amborg, who testified here today
before judges who are investigating
several irregularities in the drawing of
juries.

"The jury commissioners believe that
men who live by accepting tips are not
of a character to make good jurors,"
explained the witness.

Following are others whom the com-
missioners ignore in selecting venire-
men:

Laborers and foreign laborers, because,
as a rule, not of sufficient intelligence.

Boilermakers, because of defective
hearing.

Saloonkeepers and bartenders, be-
cause of their occupation.

Train dispatchers and tower-signal
men, because they are doing a great
service at their regular positions.

Others whose names are not consid-
ered are medical and theological stu-
dents, because they are exempt; ped-
dlers, junk dealers and scavengers.
