Withdrawal of Troops from Utah.—We extract the following from the orders of Secy. Floyd, in relation to the troops in Utah:

"The military forces of the department of Utah will be reduced to three companies of the second Dragoons, three companies of the Fourth artillery (including the battery) now there, and four companies of the Tenth infantry. Col. P. St. George Cook, Second Dragoon, is assigned to the command. Lieut. Col. Smith, Tenth infantry, will remain with that portion of his regiment. The remainder of the force now in Utah will be withdrawn as early as possible in the spring.

"Three of the six companies of the Tenth infantry will be withdrawn will take post at Fort Laramie—the other three companies of the Tenth infantry and the two companies of the Second Dragoons will occupy Fort Garland, New Mexico. The Fifth regiment of infantry will relieve Third infantry in New Mexico. The Seventh infantry will also take post in that department—four companies at the Gila copper mines, and six companies near the mines in Arizona.

"The troops moving from Utah to New Mexico will proceed by two general routes—the Dragoon and Seventh infantry via Timpanogas, Bridger's Pass, Sangre de Cristo Pass and Fort Garland. Their supplies will be replenished at Cheyenne Pass, by a train from Fort Laramie. The Fifth and three companies of the Tenth will move up the Spanish Fork, thence across to the head of White river and down that stream, or as direct as possible to Green river. At Green river, a strong party for the purpose of exploration, will be detached, and proceed with packs in the general direction of the Spanish trail, via Dolores river, as direct as possible to Santa Fe. The remainder of the column will continue on the route followed by Col. Loring to the valley of the Rio Grande, shortening and improving the road wherever it is practicable. The department commander will direct the details of these movements as circumstances may require."

Old Mail Matter.—It is reported that there are at this time not less than 25 sacks of old mail matter at the Muddy, 10 or 12 miles this side of Bridger, and

there is an indefinite amount of mail sacks filled with papers, some of them open and their contents scattered about at different points along the route.

There is no doubt, tons of mail matter between this city and St. Joseph, if it has not been destroyed, that should have been brought in months ago, and why, after it has been left by the way until it is of no use only for waste paper, it should be brought in, as it was last week, to the exclusion of that which was last forwarded, and would be of some use to the citizens of the territory, those only who have the matter under their supervision and control, as contractors, supervisors or carriers can tell.

The exchanges we received by that mail were, with two exceptions, December dates, several of them published before the meeting of Congress, filled with reports of the Harper's ferry tragedy, and of course not so very interesting, and not at all calculated to make a person feel good natured after waiting for the arrival of the mail until his patience was exhausted.

When will such impositions as are now constantly being practiced upon the people of Utah and the sojourners in the country cease?

General Agent Hardy of the Colorado Midland has been notified that his road has secured the honor of transporting President Roosevelt and party next week from Colorado Springs west. The transfer of the handsome special train will be made at that point on the night of the 14th, and it will travel leisurely, preceded by a pilot. Guides are now going over the snow with the idea of finding out whether it will be practicable to deliver the train at Carbonate and haul it up to Redstone over the Crystal River railroad. In addition to a composite car, buffet car and other rolling stock the special will be made up of the President's car Forest and the Pullman Rocket.

Rock Island Railway interests are reported, says the New York Herald today, to be considering the advisability of reaching the Atlantic seaboard through the acquisition of the Atlantic & Birmingham railway by the Pullman system. This would give the latter road an outlet to the coast at Brunswick, Ga., from its terminal at Birmingham, Ala. The Atlantic & Birmingham, which runs from Brunswick to Montezuma, Ga., is making preparations to complete its extension to Birmingham. It is a corporation formed under the laws of Georgia, being a consolidation of the railroad company of the same title with the Tifton & Northeastern Railroad company. It has a capitalization of \$1,620,000. It was at one time considered probable that the Rock Island would obtain the Seaboard Air Line for its desired outlet. This and other plans were discussed at various times, but never materialized.
