SULZER RESOLUTION.

Resolved by the Democrats of the house of representatives of the United States of America in caucus assembled That we sympathize with the Boers in their heroic struggle to maintain their liberty and independence and protest in the name of humanity and civilization against the continuation of a warfare which outrages the feelings of all liberty-loving people, and that we shall use our best efforts to have the Congress of e United States, being committed to a principles of arbitration for the setthement of international disputes, re-quest the president to urge upon the nment of his majesty the wisdom opting this policy for the purpose of stopping the awful atrocities now going on in South Africa, and that the ernment of the United States should aintain a strict neutrality between

RANDALL RESOLUTION.

Resolved by the Democratic memhers of the house of representatives of he United States of America in cauthe United States should by resolution express the sympathy of the United States for the people of the South Afreican republic and the Orange Free State in their heroic struggle to main-

in their liberty and independence. Resolved, That Congress, in the irit of amity and friendship, appeal to the British government, in the interat of humanity to accept overtures of eace, cease hostilities and endeavor to peace, cease noninities and endeavor to bring about a just and honorable set-tlement of existing differences, to the end that peace may be established. "Resolved. That the United States

should fairly and honorably maintain a position of strict neutrality in this contest between nations friendly to us, and see to it that the neutrality laws vigorously and impartially en-

St. Petersburg, March 19 .- The Offcial Messenger tomorrow will print the text of a Russo-French convention joint declaration, sent March 16 to the Austrian, Belgian, British, American, Spanish, German, Italian, Dutch, Chinese and Japanese governments. The declaration is as follows: "The allied Russo-French governments are wholly pleased to discern

that the Anglo-Japanese convention supports the essential principles which, according to the reiterated statements of France and Russia, constituted and still constitute the foundation of their

Their Own Interests.

"Both governments believe that the support of these principles is also a guarantee of their interests in the far east. They are compelled , however, not to lose from view the possibility of inimical action of other powers, or a repetition of disorders in China, possi-bly impairing China's integrity and free development to the detriment of

their reciprocal interests. They there-fore reserve to themselves the right to take measures to defend these inter-

The prefatory remarks say that Russia desires the maintenance of the status quo and the attainment of com-plete tranquility in the far east.

AS VIEWED IN PARIS. Paris, March 20.—The morning papers here comment with much satisfaction and approval upon the Franco-Russian declaration concerning the Anglo-Jap-anese convention, which they consider strengthens the chances of lasting peace in the far east, as contributing to the establishment of the necessary baltion of nower as a striking consecra-tion of the dual alliance and a defini-tion of its scope, field and objects. PROPOSED SWISS TARIFF. New Schedule Contains 1123 Ar-

ticles Against 476 in Old One.

Washington, March 20 .- The state de. nt has made public a synopsis projected new tariff of Switzerwhich has been transmitted by 1 States Minister Hardin, at , in a report dated Feb. 20. Mr. says that the tariff will be brought before the conseil national and the conseil d'etat in April and May next respectively, but he adds that it doubtbe much later before the thiended form which may be agreed abon by these two bodies reaches a vote. After this, he continues there reprospect of its possible submission to the people by referendum. The new schedule of duties contains 123 articles, as against 723 for the conventional tariff and 476 for the general ariff now in force. The minister notes marked increase in the rates on 600 d these 1.123 articles especially in the ase of agricultural products or their mitations for the natural and artifitally treated wines, fresh and dried tranes, cattle, meats, poultry, butter,

nargarine, cheese, etc. Mr. Hardin says that some of these nereases in tariff are for the purpose of providing enlarged revenue, but the e, as a whole, he says, is genregarded as a "tariff de guerre on the basis of which concessions will be made which are apparent reductions, but which are, in fact, augmentations of the present rates.

One at Kentucky State Reform School is Totally Destroyed.

Inmates Aronsed and Get Out Without Disaster or Disorder-Building

Finally Collapsed.

Lexington, Ky, March 20 .- The Bradley dormitory at the state school of reform near this city was destroyed by fire shortly after midnight, but all the inmates, numbering 125 boys, were sav-

The fire was discovered in the third crowd. An excursion will be run over story of the dormitory at 12:25 o'clock the Rio Grande from Utah and it is ex-The fire was discovered in the third by the night watchman. He at once notified Supt, Doak, who promptly aroused the inmates and got them safely and without disorder out of the building. The officials and the boys went to

work to save the office furniture but the flames spread quickly and the dormitory was soon in ruins. A telephone message was sent her for help and the local fire department quickly responded and an engine was quickly responded and an engine was started at once. They had about six miles to go, and although they were too late to save any part of the dor-mitory, they prevented the flames spreading to the manual training build-ing which is near the dormitory. At 10 o'clock the dormitory collapsed, and at 2 o'clock the fire was practically extinguished

extinguished. The burned building was erected in

1896 during the administration of for-mer Gov. W. O. Bradley, at a cost of \$25,000 and was insured for two thirds of its value. It was the only dormitory completed to this time excepting the one occupied by the girls three quarters of a miles away. In it were the superintendent and his family, the guards and the white boys,

family, the guards and the white boys, numbering about 125. The burning of the building leaves these young crim-inals and the superintendent without quarters. The colored boys occupy the manual training building in which are the factories, etc., and the colored girls occupy an old house, which stood on the place at the time of "farms" pur-chase by the state. Because of the badly crowded condi-
