SALT LAKE CITY, May 2, 1873.

Editor Deseret News:

We wish to offer a few suggestions through the medium of your paper in regard to the violation of the law affecting the preservation of fish in the waters of this Territory. We are all naturally selfish beings, but should, nevertheless, have a decent respect for the good opinions of those who frame just and equitable laws for the benefit of the public at large. According to the provisions of the law in the case, persons are prohibited from using seines for the procurement of trout and other fish during the months of April, May and June, respectively. Why? Because the interdicted months are considered the spawning season. It is reported that certain individuals living in the vicinity of Provo, and who are cognizant of the passage of the law referred to, are determined to violate its just provisions by continuing to use seines instead of hook and line in taking fish from Utah Lake. And furthermore, that complaints have been made to the selectmen at Provo against persons so offending, and that no proceedings have been instituted against the guilty parties.

We have not used our seine since the 25th of March last, and will not use it for taking fish before the first of July, ensuing.

Hoping these few hints may come under the observation of persons engaged in fishing pursuits, we remain, most respectfully yours,

FOREIGN.

BRUSSELS, Ont., 2.—Mrs. Redby, a resident of Grey township, yesterday drowned her three children, while temporarily insane, and subsequently attempted to drown herself.

The Prince Von Auersperg, President of the council of the empire, advancing to the foot of the throne, addressed the Emperor as follows:

"Sire, with feelings of modesty and at the same time of exultation and pride, the people of Austria gaze upon the work which testifies to the increasing power of and growing esteem for the fatherland, and to its active participation in the great task of culture. We owe this work entirely to you; it is the embodiment of your motto—'power and respect come from union, which is strength.' We therefore lay our efforts at the foot of the throne."

The Prince was followed by Doctor Foller, burgomaster of Vienna, who expressed the gratitude of the people of the capital to his majesty, and added, "Under your government Vienna has become the metropolis, and you now confer the highest consecration upon an undertaking whose whole purpose is to show what the human mind in every zone is capable of achieving in mechanics, science, and arts, and that progress may become common property and be fostered and nurtured by the co-operation of all rivalries in invention and dexterity. With the blessing of peace among the nations, this sublime creation has arisen, immortalizing the history of culture in Austria. Vienna, whose lot it is to welcome and hospitably entertain visitors from all quarters of the globe, feels proud and elated under your gracious imperial protection, and inspired with gratitude, rings forth, 'God protect your majesty.'"

The cry was taken up by thousands of voices, and echoed from all points of the building. The ceremonies closed with the chorus, "See, the conquering Hero comes," which was sung by the united musical societies and choir of the city. The Emperor and Empress, followed by distinguished personages, then traversed the western and eastern wings of the exhibition building, being received everywhere with thunders of applause. Having completed the circuit of the exhibition they departed amid salvos of artillery and the cheers of the immense crowd gathered outside the buildings.

The exhibition was inaugurated to-day by the Emperor of Austria in presence of the members of the Imperial family, royal and illustrious guests, and state and civic dignitaries.

The weather was unfavorable, but the crowds of people from all parts of the world who witnessed the imposing ceremonies, filled the rotunda and transepts of the building and portions of the grounds surrounding it. At 9 o'clock the Emperor Francis Joseph entered the rotunda with the Crown Prince Frederick William, who escorted the Empress Augusta. After them came the eldest son of the Prince, accompanied by the Prince Imperial of Austria. The Emperor took his seat on the throne, when the combined bands, numbering several hundred musicians, performed the Austrian Hymn, which was succeeded by the Prussian Anthem. Amid the cheers of the multitude, the Archduke Charles then arose, and addressing the Emperor he said:

"Sire—Filled with gladness I salute your majesty in these halls devoted to progress and to peace. Your participation has fitly brought to completion the work which now draws upon Austria the eyes of the world, and has secured for the fatherland a full recognition of the part she takes in the promotion of the welfare of mankind through instruction and labor. May it please your majesty graciously to receive this catalogue, and to declare the exhibition open."

The Emperor, receiving the casket containing the catalogue, replied with lively satisfaction, "I behold the completion of this undertaking of importance and significance, which I appreciate in the highest degree. My confidence in the patriotism and capability of my people and in the support of friendly nations, has accomplished the development of the great work. My well wishes and grateful recognition are the devotion due to its termination, and I now declare the Universal Exhibition of 1873 opened."

LONDON, 4.—The banquet preceding the opening of the annual exhibition at the Royal Academy, was held last night, and was attended by a brilliant and distinguished company. After the usual toasts to the Queen and royal family, Sir Francis Grant, President of the Academy, proposed the prosperity of the United States, and in a graceful speech congratulated the American people on the development of art in their country. The toast was eloquently acknowledged by Schenck, the American minister.
