Board of Governors of the Commercial Club Discuss Committee's Report.

PILGRIMAGE TO LOS ANGELES.

Members May Take an Excursion to City of the Angels on May 1.

The report written by the Commercial club committee that made the commercial pilgrimage to Los Angeles, was presented to the board of governors last evening, and accepted. The report is replete with interesting information. and shows that the committee made pretty good use of its powers of observation. It is as follows:

"We made such examination of the new road and the various towns along its line as was possible in the time at our disposal. We found an excellent roadbed with 75-pound steel ralis, and large forces of laborers engaged in preparing for the installation of train service. We were officially informed that the road would not be ready for the regular transportation of freight and passengers much before May 1. The road is at present equipped with many 115-ton oil-burning engines, and the freight and passenger equipment is un-der contract for delivery by April 15. "From conversation with various ef-
