The wool busines in Carbon county about over, and the wool warehouse Il soon close, says the Carbon Coun-Journal. Shearing has been over with for some time, and the shearers have all left for the north, where the season is later. Wool has been coming in from the south very slowly, especial ly the clip of the Geddes Sheep company, the cause being, a strike among the teamsters. The company offered to pay 40 cents a hundred, but the strikers

wanted 50 cents, and not until there were 100 sachs strewn along the road, which the haulers dumped off their wagons, did the company agree to pay them their price. Wool which was loaded at the pens on the 18th of May did not get here until Monday last. The Geddes Sheep company now have 521 sacks in the warehouse and 200 at the shearing pens, but with 20 teams hauling it will be only a short time before the whole clip will be here ready for sale. The sacks average about 300 pounds each, which makes a total of 216,300 pounds in their clip. houses. 'he clip belonging to the Rawlinsdve Stock company and Edwards & Roberts are the only two remaining clips in the wool warehouse besides future. Geddes Sheep company's, which consists of 399 sacks and weight about 119,000 pounds. The owners of these are holding them in the hope that they will secure a better market

than has yet been experienced The amount of wool already secured shipped by the Rawlins Wool Warehouse and Storage company is to exceed 1,300,000 pounds, or 65 carloads. Franklin O'Meria received the highst price for his clip, which consisted of 10,000 pounds, than any wool sold n the warehouse under sealed bids.

The price was 16½ cents per pound. The lowest price was 13½ cents, but the average price was 15% cents per It is now estimated that the woolshipments from Casper this season vill exceed 5,250,000 pounds. Of this amount 3,000,000 has been shipped so far this season.
