The New Liquor Ordinance.-In strict accordance with the rulings of Chief Justice Hunter, the whisky combination of this city has been running things in an indiscriminate fashion. Drinking saloons have been kept going how and when it pleased their proprietors, the city ordinance in relation to that destructive branch of business having been decided void, on a technicality.

In Judge Hunter's decisions he has intimated that the city has the right to regulate the liquor traffic, but not to license or tax it. The new ordinance passed on Tuesday night, by the City Council, is confined to this limited prerogative. Doubtless there will soon be some cases brought into the Courts under it. The oridinance, so far as it goes, is judicious, but will not be acceptable to the whisky sellers.

While on this question, in view of the encouragement that is given to intemperance, which is unvariably followed by a hideous train of kindred evils wherever it gains an extended foothold, we have thought it might be a good thing to get up a local history of the question, in its present phase, and, in pamphlet shape, send it out broadcast over the country. It might be a good thing to exhibit the doings of the selfrighteous regulators of this cominunity.
