'Bryan, Bryan," said Mr. Powers thoughtfully, "well I guess they didn't miss me much down at New York. Fact is I didn't know a thing about being wanted down there till I got to Omaha on my way home. Then I picked up a Salt Lake paper at a de-pot news stand, and found that Senator Bamberger had named me a dele-gate, to represent him at the recep-

'No, it wasn't the fault of anyone but myself I was not notified. You see I was pretty well out of the reach of telegrams and the mail service as well, for almost all the time I have been away I have been on the water of the great lakes, with Mrs. Powers and our youngster. My trip was just a vacation, and had no business or political purposes. When asked as to the extent of his

castern trip Judge Powers said that he was a humble convert of Fisher Harris to the doctrine of "See America First." and had been out doing just that sort of thing. "There's nothing in Europe to compare with the lake country," he said. "Europe oughtn't to be men-tioned in the same paragraph with it. The thousand islands are a dream, that's all, and every American should see them and know those lakes before he can know his country. And Utah why I struck them everywhere, I do believe Utah people travel more than any other people on earth. They go away up into Canada and over 10 Europe without thinking it much of a

"Who do you think I met in Niagara city? Walking along the street I heard snores, and there sitting in front of a hotel sound asleep in a chair was our good friend, Col. Wall. At his office in the McCornick block, Chairman Hammond received a delega-tion of Sanpete county workers, consisting of Swen O. Nielsen of Fair-view, and Fred C. Jensen of Mt. Pleasant. The men brought up much political news for Mr. Hammond, and in an interview expressed themselves frankly on the situation in that coun-

For the local offices in Sanpete county, the disposition is to run the present incumbents again on the Republican ticket, where they have had only one term. For the senatorship to fill the place now occupied by Senator Larsen of Manti, there are numerous aspirants preparing to make the run for the nomination. Larsen will probably be a candidate for re-election. L. R. An-derson, mayor of Manti, will be out for the place, as will also Henry Kearns of Gunnison. For positions in the of Gundison. For positions in the house of representatives, no candidates are definitely spoken of as yet, although a number of likely young inen are de-sirous of landing places in the list of candidates.

In Millard county, Senator Callister-holds over, so there is no senatorial con-test down there. In the county ticket the Republicans expect to nominate present incumbents in the main, except reases where they have had two
