Webb was subsequently chosen company commander, but at the breaking out of the Spanish war was made second lieutenant of Battery A, Utah Light artillery, rising to the position of first lieutenant before mustering out. Capt. Webb re-entered the Utah National guard as first lieutenant of the light battery stationed in this city, becoming its captain on the retirement of Capt. Grow, and remaining in that position for two years, when he resigned. The captain has been commander of cadets at the high school for four years, during which time he has brought the cadet battalion to a high condition of proficiency. As a military scholar and tactician, he has won a recognized reputation.

Uncle Sam is a friend of the old. The old, the feeble, and the infirm employees of the treasury department can rest in peace—Uncle Sam has decided to see that they hold their positions until their dying day.

Several weeks ago a committee was appointed for the purpose of increasing the efficiency of the service. This was done at the suggestion of Secy. Cortelyou. Those on the committee are James E. Reynolds, acting secretary of the treasury; Asst. Secys. Winthrop and Edwards; Comptroller Trueswell, and Auditor Person.

For a time it looked as though there was a possibility that the committee might do away with the services of many of those who had grown gray and weak in the department. Meetings were held and the question discussed. Most of the executives were in favor of reform, but at the same time keeping the pensioners. And at last this was decided upon.

The treasury department has in its employ more veterans of the Civil war and other aged citizens, both men and women, than any other branch of the service. They occupy positions in all parts of the great building. Some of them have been there practically all their lives. One of these is E. B. McSwiney, 92 years of age, the oldest man in the service of the United States government.

These people have been loyal and

true to old Uncle Sam. Their work has been their ideal, their future, and their livelihood. And then the news was whispered about the great reforms and through all the various offices that a reform was to be instituted. Naturally the veterans in the service became anxious. Many of them are without any support in the world except their salary, received monthly from the government.

One of the characteristic sights of Washington is to see the government clerks going to and leaving their work. Many of them at the treasury, and the other departments, too, for that matter, some in different styled antiquated vehicles. Some of these are old night liners which are nearly worn out after years of service here in social lines and other duties, when many notables occupied the cushioned seats.

These cabs have fallen into the hands of old negro drivers and many of them have their regular customers, whom they carry to and from their work every day. Not a few of the employees use crutches. Others are still strong enough to get along with the assistance of a cane, and riding on the cars, wend their way slowly through the immense structure to their respective quarters.

Some of these arriving in their own or hired vehicles almost have to be carried into the building and to the elevator. The report of the proposed reform spread like wildfire. The dear, old women and the trusty men of years were almost broken-hearted. To work for the government is second nature with them. Without their positions they would be virtually lost, out in the world, with a home, maybe, and still with a feeling of homesickness. They feel that if their services were dispensed with they would be like "men without a country."

The anxious ones were kept on the anxious seat for weeks after they first heard the news. Then gradually the talk spread that old Uncle Sam had shown his hand. There was to be no weeding out of the old and the feeble and infirm just because they were not as young as they used to be. Because they had grown old in the service, it seemed to the officials, was all the more reason why these certain employees should be retained.

Old Uncle Sam has made good again—his old faithfuls are to be kept at work, every last one of them, until the very end.

The committee, however, has decided to increase the efficiency of the department along some other lines. A study of the different divisions will be made and eventually the treasury department will have a new system installed.

SYSTEM TO BE IMPROVED.

The work of the department has been on the increase for years. The result of the reform movement will be that the force is not reduced, the old retained, and a system brought into use whereby the employees will be kept up with the work without the employment of any extra help.

With a view of saving money for the government, the board of awards of the departments has appointed a committee to devise a plan of uniform schedule for purchasing supplies during the next fiscal year. A central purchasing bureau was recommended by the Keep commission some time ago.

The uniform schedule, as arranged by the committee, will be submitted to the contractors for the various departments. In this way, instead of buying singly, it is believed the government will save money when buying pencils and paper and other office materials. Washington Herald.



UTAH PIONEER WAGON AND SCULPTOR.
