The track of the Eastern Division is already five miles west of Cheyenne. The company expect to reach Pond Creek by the fifteenth of May.

The Chicago, Burlington and Quincy railway company intend soon to place a lightning train upon their road, to run from Quincy in ten hours.

A young man recently ascended the tower of London Crystal Palace, read the appropriate portion of the Church service, and threw himself down, killing himself instantly.

The present estimate of the number of cattle in Texas is 5,000,000 head. Raising beavers and selling cotton to the Mexicans are yielding a good profit to the people of that State.

The Arkansas convention recently voted on a resolution to prohibit amalgamation of the races. The vote was a party one, the Radicals and blacks voting for prohibition and the Conservatives against it.

The distance by the lines run by Gen. Palmer of the Union Pacific Railway, E. D. through New Mexico and Arizona, from the Missouri River to San Francisco, is 1,950 miles; from New York, 3,302 miles; from New York to San Diego, 3,022 miles.

A young peddler is traveling through Vermont, stopping at farm houses over night. In the morning when his bill is presented, he astonishes the farmer by asking "to see his license to keep a tavern." Of course it is not produced, and the bill is not paid.

A French editor proposes to connect England and France by a bridge, bearing a double line of railway, a carriage and foot way, with shops and a restaurant. The bridge would rest on thirty-two iron piles, would be 335 feet broad and 670 feet high—335 feet above the sea level. All this for the moderate sum of \$80,000,000.

Reports have reached Fort Ransom, Dakota, that Standing Buffalo, head chief of the Sissetons, who was one of the leaders in the Minnesota massacre, to Fort Totten, recently sent a messenger for food, and asking for food and ammunition. This chief was the last one of any note to hold out, and he is at the head of a large and powerful band.

It is proposed to build G. F. Train's hotel at Cheyenne on the one he had commenced—by subscription. G. F. T.'s share in the concern has slipped out of the "small end of the horn."

A Matteawan correspondent of the Fishkill Journal says that Mr. R. D. Hine, a resident of that place, has, by intricate labor, solved the long-sought problem to combine wool and fur in equal quantities, so as to produce a hat which shall have the durability of wool and the glossy appearance of fur, there by making a neat, cheap and durable hat.

A singular freak of the snow and wind has recently been witnessed by numerous people on the eastern side of Seneca Lake, New York. In a large field great bunches of snow were scattered about, each with a hole through it like a muff. They varied in size, being from three to ten inches in diameter. They presented the appearance of a vast number of white fur muffs scattered about.
