Consequently, in such centers of in struction the respective diocesan hish-ops, either by themselves or by special elegation, shall exercise the right, in hatever concerns religious or morals

Second-As soon as the law officers of this government shall have decided ipon the question of the title which the New Panama Canal company is able to give to all the properties and rights claimed by it and pertaining to a canal across the 1sthmus and covered by the pending proposal.
