Striking Feature of Campaign Has Been the Energy Shown for Getting Nominations.

# PURPOSE OF HIS OWN CAMPAICN

It is to Revive and Reorganize the Real Democratic Sentiment of The Country.

Chiago, Oct. 10 .- Thomas E. Watson, nominee of the People's party for president, spoke here tonight to an audience which filled the Princess rink to overfowing. The policies of both Republicas and Democratic parties were scored bitterly by Mr. Watson, and his declarations were received with enthusiasm. Mr. Watson spoke in part as follows: The most striking feature of the present campaign is that more energy was displayed in obtaining nominations than there has been in securing elections. In Judge Parker's campaign particularly there was ten times more industry, carnestnes, systematic effort st forth in the effort to have him nam-ed as head of the Damocratic ticket than is now being used to have him disted president. This is certainly a

deted president. This is certainly a very peculiar situation. How are "it requires explanation. How are we to explain it? It is that the corpor-ation influences which control the Re-publican party desire to perpetuate that system? To do this they must, if pos-shie, secure control of the Democratic able, secure control of the Democratic organization. The corporation influences to which Parker owes his nomination were hall bent on having him nominat-ed, but it is a matter of indifference whether he be elected or not.
