A HORRIBLE CHARGE.

Dr. Gardner accused of the awful crime of abortion—his alleged victim.

Reverend Gardner created a sensation last night by arresting Dr. Frederick Gardner, of this city, on the charge of procuring abortion. The complainant, J. A. White, and old disinterested on East South Temple street, who alleges that a rapid Transit street car conductor named Charles Caldwell refused his daughter by inducing her to become a subject of his criminal actions and subsequently to allow her to become the victim of Dr. Gardner's malignancy.

She first met Caldwell when he came to this city six or eight months ago, and says she was a frequent passenger on the Rapid Transit car of which he was conductor, and an intimate acquaintance sprang up between them. She says that she had the utmost confidence in the promises made by Caldwell, and finally

yielded to his desires with the express understanding that he would marry her, a promise which she still assumes he should keep.

Dr. Gardner is said to have committed the offense yesterday. White arrested him, but taken before Justice Olen and gave bond in the sum of \$1000 pending a preliminary examination, which will be held tomorrow next week or next Thursday at the victim of his alleged unlawful work is strong enough to appear in court. Dr. Gardner is represented by J. C. Cook, brother of Assistant City Attorney Cook.

HE MET A VIOLENT DEATH.

A convict at the Utah Penitentiary Has a Fatal Fall.

While performing his task.

The Deceased Said to be a Son of General Scottle, of the British Army.

A lamentable accident happened at the Utah penitentiary about nine o'clock last night, by which one of the convicts lost his life. He was registered on the jail ledger as Frederick Drummond, but had the aliases of F. G. Saville, Fred Saville and F. G. Scottle. He was by birth an Englishman, of liberal education, his age 25, and he is said to be a son of General Scottle, of the British army, who was killed in England in 1840. He was a convict for a term of years for a crime of which he was acquitted on appeal.

The unfortunate mishap occurred in this way: Ever since the commencement of his incarceration Drummond had been working as a sort of policeman in the penitentiary. He was a general favorite with officers and prisoners, and was looked upon as an exceptionally trustworthy young fellow. Part of his work was to open and close the windows of the prison proper, and it was while engaged in this occupation that the fatal accident occurred. He was standing upon the sill of one of the windows, throwing his body out, when he slipped and fell backwards upon his head with considerable force, rupturing the base of the skull and fracturing the skull.

He was immediately taken to the hospital, but he died about an hour and a half after he was taken there. His death was a great loss to the penitentiary, as he was a very capable and trustworthy man.
