#### some Jumped from Windows and Were Badly Injured-Loss Nearly a Hundred Thousand.

Butte, Mont., July 13 .- At 2:40 this porning a still alarm was turned in om the Butte hotel, a four story tructure on Broadway. When the remen reached the scene the building ras enveloped in smoke, which appeared to pour from every open winow. The firemen were unable to loate the blaze for some thirty minutes and the greatest confusion prevailed. A number of guests on the lower floors acceeded in groping their way down stairs in the smoke and escaping with nothing but their night clothes. Scores of others were rescued from the upper windows, where the panic-stricken guests shrieked for succor and threat-ened to jump to the sidewalk below. At this hour it is impossible to state whether there has been any loss of life, owing to the confusion.

At 3:15 the firemen were still rescuing half-suffocated guests from the upper stories but were unable to get inside the building on account of the smoke. The fire is apparently under control but the smoke is very heavy and nothing the smoke is very heavy and nothing is known as to the condition of the guests in the inside rooms, of which

But two of the in-surgents were killed, the remainder taking flight, throwing down eighteen rifles and a thousand rounds of ammunition.

"As soon as Segovia had given the order he ran back into the house and opened fire on the officers surrounding Aruinaldo. He wounded Villa and

Hambra. The latter jumped out of the house into the river and was not seen again. Villa, on being wounded, surrendered, as did also Santiago Var-celona, Aguinaldo's treasurer. The five remaining officers escaped from the house and swam the river. "Placido selzed Aguinaldo and told him that he was a prisoner of the Americans. At this juncture the
