Capt. Wood and Miller of the Salvation Army have charge of the arrangements to give the local poor a Christmas program, with trees and presents, and are soliciting articles of apparel, candy and provisions for that purpose.

The First Methodist ladies opened their Christmas market last evening at the church, where a musical program was given, with solos by Prof. Nettleton, Mrs. N. P. Hess of Ogden, Richard Treasie and others. The fair was well patronized.

The coal strike situation has not improved, and while some miners are still operating, the output is much restricted, and unless a settlement is soon effected general business will suffer materially.

Smooth Work by Holdups Who Impersonate Officers and Rob A. C. Paulin.

## TOOK A SHOT AT PURSUERS.

When Chased by Phil Maycock, Iverson And Weiler, the Thugs Fired Point Blank.

There are a couple of smooth crooks in town who hold citizens up and rob them by impersonating police officers. This is not a new trick by any means, but that it is successful is not doubted for a moment by A. C. Paulin, the latest victim of the craft, if it be called a craft.

While on his way home last evening, he was met at Fourth South and East Temple street by two men who informed him that they were police officers; that he was under arrest, and would have to go with them. Paulin did not resist, thinking the officers had made a mistake, which would soon be rectified. But imagine his surprise when they took him behind a tree and proceeded to "go through" his pockets.

While the searching process was going on, Phil Maycock, L. E. Iverson and George Weiler happened along, and rightly concluded that Paulin was being robbed. They asked him if the men were robbing him, but Paulin had been warned by one of the hold-ups, and replied in the negative. The three young men then started up the street, but Paulin broke away from the hold-ups and yelled for help. The robbers fled across the street and ran down through a church street, Maycock, Iverson and Weiler followed them and were joined in the chase by several other persons. Suddenly one of the robbers turned on the pursuers and fired at them. The two men then separated and disappeared. The police were notified and are in hot pursuit.

## VERDICT IN THE KIFFORD CASE.

Jury Says the Defendant is Guilty Of Voluntary Manslaughter.

## PENALTY ONE TO TEN YEARS.

Kifford Shot and Killed William Harvey In This City on the Night of October 23, 1903.

The jury in the Moss Kifford murder case last night at 8:40 o'clock returned into Judge Morse's court with a verdict of guilty of voluntary manslaughter. The case was concluded at about 4:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon and submitted to the jury. The jury retired and at 6 o'clock went to dinner. At 7:30 o'clock it was announced that a verdict had been reached and Judge Morse and the officers of the court were notified and as soon as they arrived the jury was taken into the court room. The penalty for voluntary manslaughter is from one to ten years in the state prison.

Kifford, on the night of Oct. 23, 1903, shot and killed William Harvey, known as "Bad Alie," on Franklin avenue. His attorneys, Kinney & Christensen, are not satisfied with the verdict and will file a motion for a new trial. Kifford will be sentenced by Judge Morse on Saturday morning at 10 o'clock. It is said that three ballots were taken before a verdict was reached. All but one of the jurors favored a verdict of voluntary manslaughter but he held out for murder in the second degree. He changed his vote on the third ballot.
