The Hopkins and Robinson Cases.

Five Arrested Again, Etc.

CINCINNATI, Dec. 18.—Bruce, for the

government, stated they expected to

show Hopkins had misappropriated \$300,000

of the Fidelity Bank's funds and \$70,000

at another time; that he had drawn

personal checks upon the bank for

large amounts when he had no funds to

draw upon, and that he had made false

entries in the books of the bank

representing a million dollars used in

Bestman, for the defense, said they

Washington Notes.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13.—[A response

to the resolution of inquiry, the com-

missioner of agriculture today sent a

communication to the Senate that a

patent had been granted to Professor

Swenson for an improvement in the

method of making sugar

which improved the commissioner

believed was the best yet devised.

Swenson while in government employ,

while making experiments with the

The Senate committee on finance

held its first meeting this morning,

and ordered a favorable report of the

bill to refund to the States direct tax

imposed by act of 1861. The aggregate

is about fifteen millions. It is the bill

passed by the Senate last year.

The second annual convention of

the fourth-class postmasters of the

United States met here this morning.

Chairman, Hon. Robert Wright, of

Michigan; Secretary, George W. Brady,

of West Virginia; Assistant

Secretaries, J. G. Herick, of Ohio, and

A. C. Winchel, of Iowa. A permanent

secretary was elected from each state

represented. The principal object of

the convention is to obtain the passage

of a bill by Congress increasing

and equalizing, on a basis of the work

performed by the postmaster of third

and fourth-class postmasters.

The Senate committee on privileges

and immunities today received a re-

port from the committee on the West

Virginia contested election case. Both

both submitted written briefs. The

committee discussed the matter for an

hour and adjourned until tomorrow.

THE COAST SURVEY.

Superintendent Thorpe, of the

United States coast and geodetic sur-

coast of the United States. He pointed

out the importance of the work and

imperatively demanded by the inter-

ests of commerce and navigation.
